Artist Award Scheme

Purpose

To assist professional practicing artists working in any artform, discipline or genre in the development of their practice.

Proposals have included participation on short-term courses, residencies, specialist workshops, mentorship programmes.

The award has been used to 'buy time' to develop or research a new body of work or to contribute to the costs of participation in a residency or other professional development programme or opportunity

Maximum offered €5000

Response to COVID – 19

In recognition of the challenges posed to artists continuing to create work in a time of physical distancing, we are offering artists an opportunity to take time to recalibrate their work.

We are enabling artists to explore and test meaningful ways to make work, to develop their practice, taking an innovative approach to the challenges that we all face.

Artists and Communities Collaboration Award

Purpose

To support artist and community collaboration in any discipline or genre of the arts to develop or realise a high-quality project or programme which will support both the artist's and the community's creative development.

It is the intention of this award to fund in total or in part either (i) a research and development phase of a planned initiative or (ii) the production/ realisation of a new arts project or programme in 2021.

Maximum offered €5000

Response to COVID – 19

This new fund will create opportunities for artists and communities of place and / or interest to grow new ideas and resource themselves to generate something new, to test out some innovative thinking and ways of working together to collaboratively create a new project or activity.

The aim of this programme is to empower communities to creatively move forward in 2021

- Match what best suits your own goals and what best fits the criteria
- Be convinced of what you want to achieve yourself
- Plan: Plan: Plan
- Build a case throughout the form
- Be as clear as you can and **answer the QUESTIONS**
- Have opportunities / mentors confirmed
- Support your application with relevant material and present it well




Making Great Art Work 2016 - 2025

Types of funding to apply for

■ Project Awards €10,000 to €350,000

A project you wish to do, which involves the creation and presentation of new work. A project award has a beginning, middle and end.

■ Bursary Awards €10,000 - €15,000

Funding your time to nurture your work, to think, research, reflect and critically engage with your practice.



Making an application

- Check eligibility and fit and call us if you are not sure
- Give yourself plenty of time to write and plan
- Clearly communicate your idea, be ambitious, be compelling
- Remember it is competitive and lots of people will read your application
- Plan your **budget** carefully
- Gather letters of support (not on the deadline day)
- Do not upload 30 mins before the deadline!
- Check what you need to upload for essential material... you must include them, or your application will unfortunately be made ineligible.



• Why does it feel onerous?

- We are a state agency with €130m (2021) worth of public funding
- We are **subject to changes in legislation** and to rigorous government audit
- In 2019 we received 3,349 applications and awarded 1,191 grants (36% success rate).
 In 2020, this doubled.
- Ineligible applications (12%)
- We aim for a **2 to 8 week turnaround** for project / bursaries
- This requires a rigour of procedure and fairness to all applicants
- We check to make sure projects are feasible and realistic.



How we can help more

- We welcome calls from applicants in advance, especially new
- We are actively encouraging applications from diverse artists to reflect the breadth of arts practice in Ireland
- We provide feedback on applications that are not successful
- We ensure funding decisions (on bursaries and most awards) are assessed by a peer panel, experts in art form and/or arts practice
- Most bursaries and awards have funding clinics (online)
- We are constantly reviewing our procedures, to make sure user-ability with accountability is balanced
- We are listening to the needs of the sector

What happens next?

- If you do not meet eligibility you will get a 'regret' letter to explain this. 12% of applications are ineligible. This is a technical issue not a judgement call. You may revise / submit your application again.
- If you have met eligibility requirements your application will be acknowledged
- It goes through a **shortlisting process**, all applications are read by multiple people
- The shortlisted applications will go to a peer panel for final decision making (all bursaries, most projects)
- You will get a result in 6-8 weeks
- If you are not successful **you can request feedback** on your application



- You used to get a large envelope! Now it's an email.
- This contains conditions and a guide to draw down funding (please read these!)
- You need to make sure your bank account is in the right name and can accept EFT.
- You can usually draw down 80% in the beginning (Online Services)
- You can drawdown 20% upon completion, with an income and expenditure sheet and a report.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION I

Letters of support

These add value and impact to your application and are studied by assessors. Best to ask *one* person who knows you, supports you and can make an informed comment on your work, rather than e.g. a number of people in senior or influential positions who might only be able to make a generalised or impersonal recommendation. Request your letter/s three weeks in advance of the deadline.

Artist Statement/Personal Statement

This is required for e.g. the Countess Markievicz Award and the Next Generation Award. This is a great opportunity to express your individuality, your artistic ambitions, interests, influences, approach. Take time to write this – one A4 page - and be personal rather than abstract or theoretical in how you write it. Don't repeat what is already in your application form or CV. Ask someone else to read your final draft.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION II

CV

Make sure it's up to date and includes all of your relevant achievements: previous awards, publications, exhibitions, commissions, performances, residencies. This is how your track record will be assessed so make sure nothing is minimised or played down. Don't assume that the assessors know you: some may be reading about you for the first time, so it's an opportunity to present your work and your talents with pride and confidence.

Work samples

Be very selective and think hard about what to choose. Make sure that you submit work/work-inprogress that is current and that excites you now, rather than work from the past that may no longer reflect your current artistic interests/development.

Target your application

Make sure that your application directly addresses the objectives and priorities of the particular award for which you're applying. Each art form team has particular priorities for each award and some of the multi-disciplinary awards have specific purposes and aims, e.g. the Next Generation Award and the Countess Markievicz Award. These will be outlined in the award Guidelines, so it's crucial to study these in advance.

The Big Idea and The Published Arts Plan

Reflective practice

Keep a reflective journal/notebook for your overall ongoing practice – remember your big ideas

The <u>idea/project gets the funding – not you.</u>

You just receive the funding as the facilitator of the Project

Funding Bodies will award funds to projects that can be demonstrated to fit with their published strategic priorities

- Does yours?
- Can it be seen to?
- Has that been spelt out in the application for the assessors?

Become aware of your Funding Environment

Keep up to date on available funding awards

I keep six honest serving-me (They taught me all I knew); Their names are What and Why and When And How and Where and Who.

Explaining the Proposal

- What? Give the Project Details
- Why? What will be achieved. Why is it important?
- When? What's the Timeline?
- **How?** Will the project be realised is it feasible?
- Where? Locations where it will all take place
- Who? Will be involved include Biogs & CVs

Afterwards...

Try not to take it all too personally – Succeed or Fail. It's all just part of the job. Keep applying, and applying, and...

- There's a certain amount of luck of the draw in success
- Who else applies...
- How much funding is available...
- Who's on the assessing panel...

But <u>ALWAYS</u> ask for Feedback – win or lose...

Recognise that getting the first successful application through is a task in itself – maybe include being mentored, training/upskilling opportunities for yourself etc.



The money is there to be awarded to someone...

Why not your Project?

How do you answer the funders' stated objectives?

1. Applications - just part of the job

2. Applications tend to be emotionally draining

3. Discover your Big Idea – your Mission

4. Read guidelines <u>many</u> times – use highlighter. Feed priorities and phrases into your application

5. Include Testimonials/Reviews/Quotes – can make a significant impression

6. Include Letters of Support/Partner organisations

7. CV - easy to digest but as impressive as possible

8. Include a Statement of Intent/Artist Statement

9. Keep it pithy and punchy – don't <u>over</u> explain your personal viewpoint

10. Use positive language – *I will do* not *I hope to do.*

11. Don't be overly self-effacing – believe passionately in your project and sell it

12. <u>Get your budget correct.</u> Applications have to be whittled down – don't be easily whittled.

13. It can help to **have a track record** – try to get your first funding award achieved

14. Mentors (a safe pair of hands/spreading the budget) – might help get your first funding

30 top tips

15. Takes [me] 5 hours per application to recycle an idea/previous application

16. Files (especially media) can be very slow to upload – especially at deadline time

17. Hit 'Save Draft' on online uploads neurotically

18. Watch out for accidental uploads of the whole application when you press 'Next'

19. Watch out for formatting issues with online applications

20. Write application in a Word Doc – format as a you want. Then copy and paste into the form.

21. Watch out for word limits – editing can take as long as writing the application

22. Make generous use of '&' and '--' and bullet points etc. to save on word/character count

23. If needed remove 'full stops' at the end of bullet points to save on word/character

24. Save to the Cloud – in case of power cuts/unexpected events. They happen!

25. Provide for some post-Project evaluation & feedback. Be able to demonstrate how

26. Get someone else to read it. Is it clear? Is it compelling?

27. Get Feedback from the panel regardless of the outcome

28. Save all your material for your next application

29. It gets easier the more you do it – a bit...

30. 2011 - the year I nearly gave up...

And some more tips from Eamon from chat ...

1. Awards constitute an outstanding opportunity

2. Positive point of writing an application is the distilling of your ideas - whether you are successful or not

3. Every word in a funder's strategic goals is relevant - study strategic goals and decision criteria (feasibility, tracks record etc) 4. Can take weeks to reach an Arts Manager for support. Develop personal relationships.Save mobile numbers. Everybody's busy at deadline time

5. Look at/plan the money from the start

6. Your 3 top points and initial description in the application is vital – make it punchy

7. Clarity/organisation in your application presentation will support confidence in your ability to organise project and to deliver it
