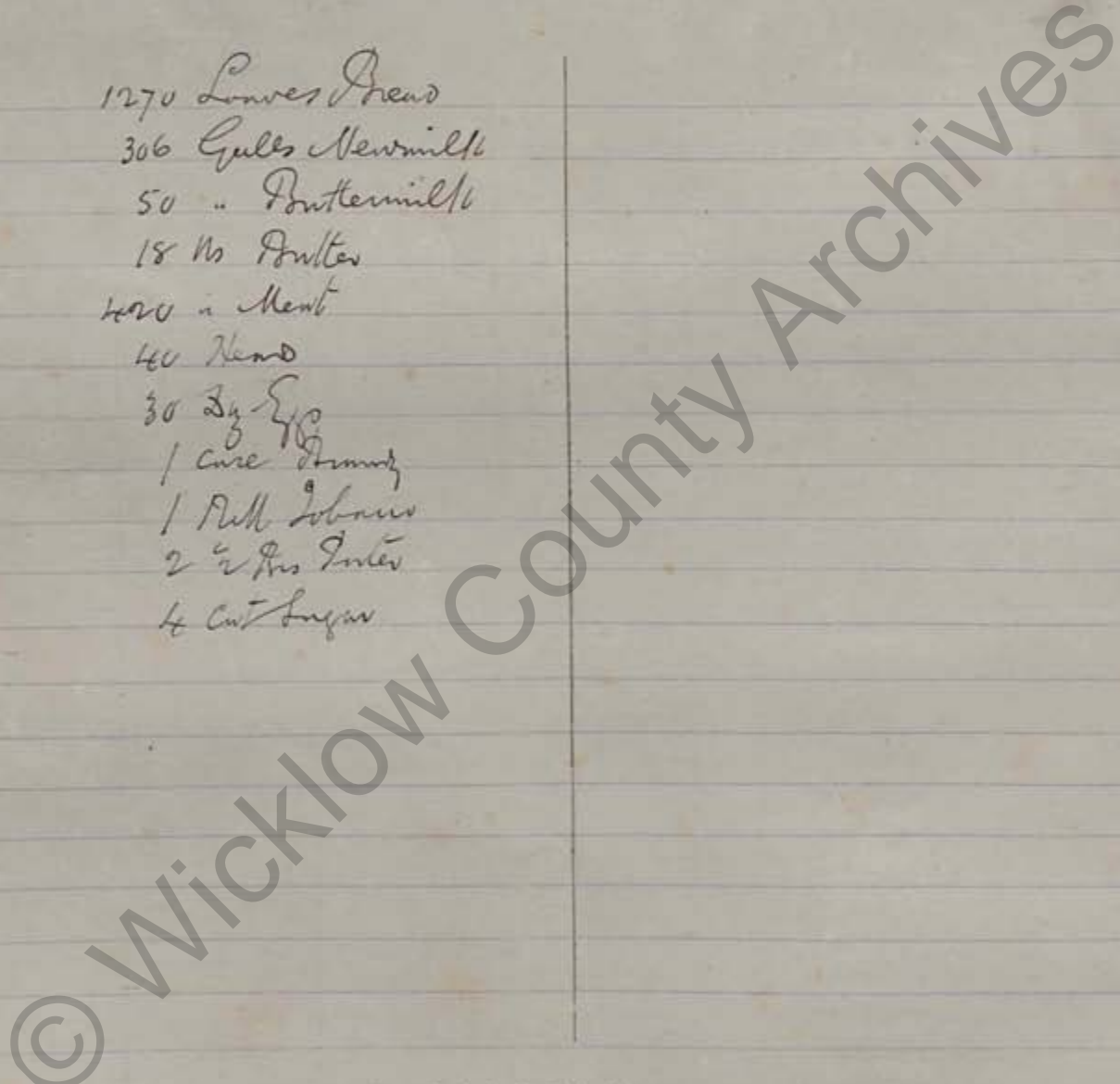

MacCabe reports that the Hospital accommodation is insufficient, and that the Female Lunatic Ward is much overcrowded; a sufficient number of benches is not provided for them to rest on during the day; Benches are also needed in their dormitory and a few ought to be placed in their exercise yard.

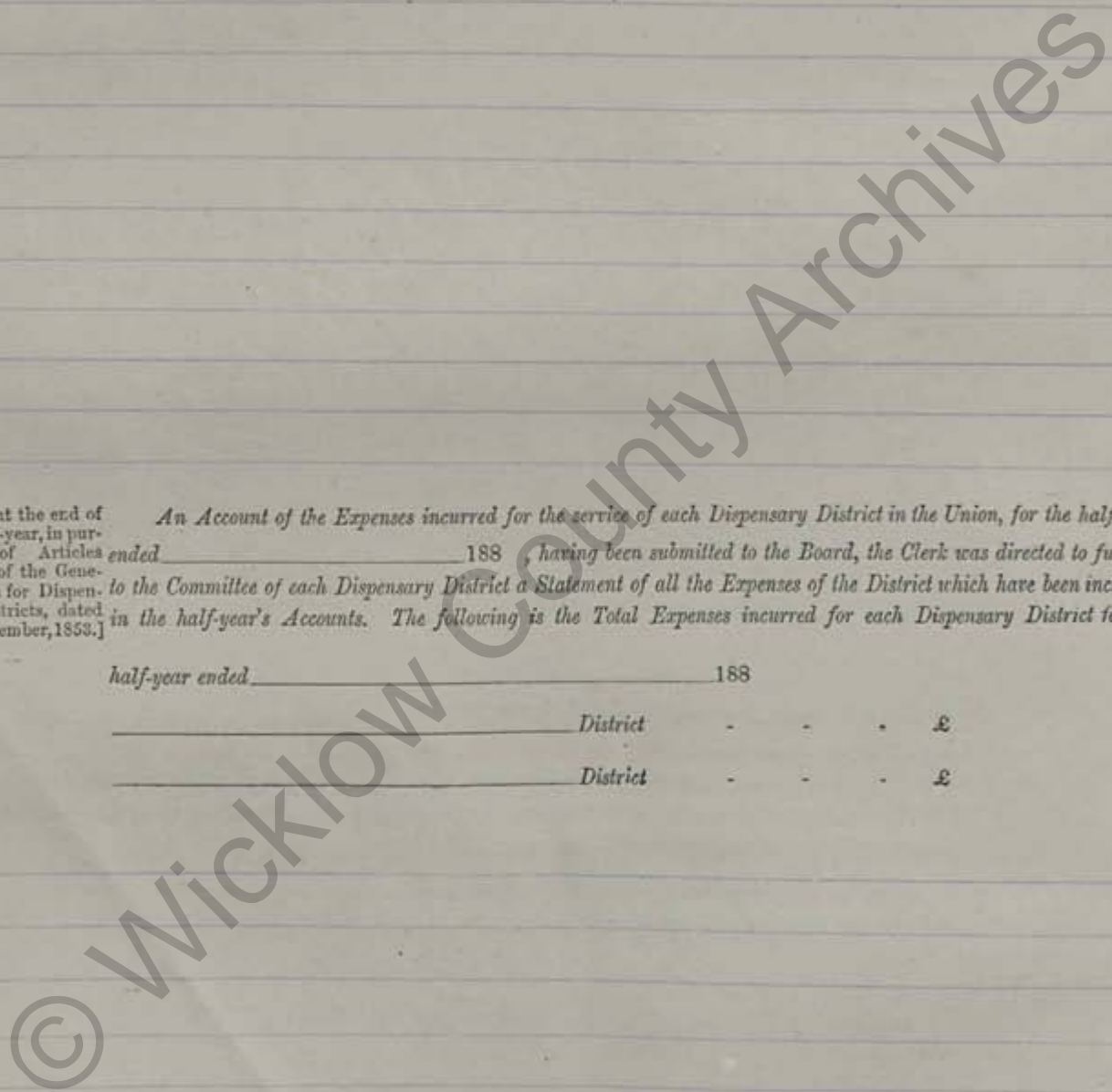

There are in the District three fairly qualified Midwives, and agreeing with the Wicklow Dispensary Committee we see no necessity of appointing at present a permanent official.

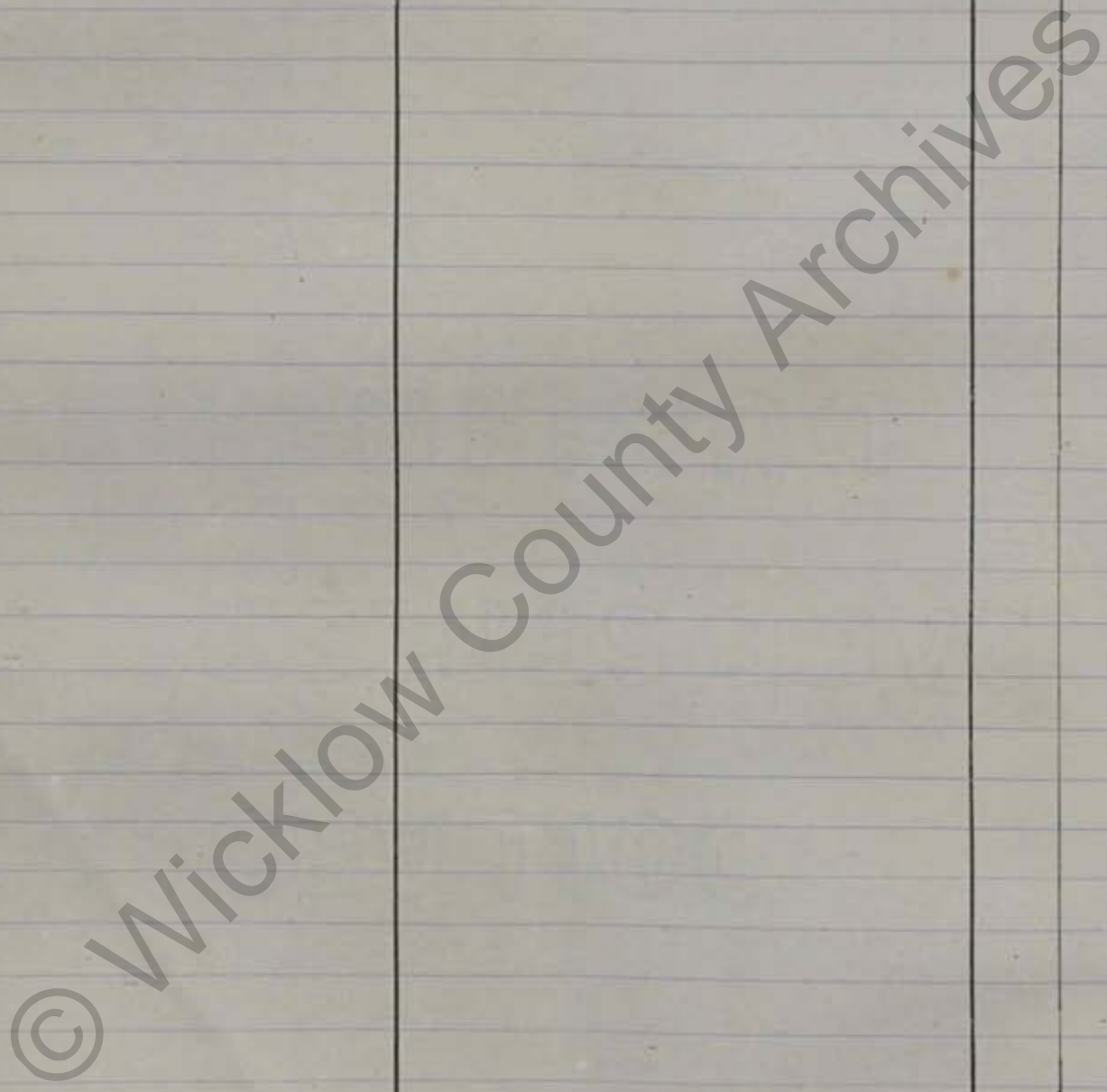

Board that having questioned the Relieving Officer they find that the Notice of Eviction was duly served on the Relieving Officer, who from his knowledge considered the party not in such circumstances as to require Poor Law Relief; He did not attend the eviction as there was no date stated; and receiving notice from Mr. Fleming that he attended and made enquiries the result being that in consultation with Mr. Fleming he did not consider Mrs. Farrell a case of destitution; but the Local Guardian (Mr. Fleming) considered she should under the circumstances be allowed of a week for one month:

Read Letter from June of same date, informing the Guardians that they have received from their Inspector, Dr. Mac Cabe, his half yearly report relating to this Union which is generally of a satisfactory character as regards the management of the Workhouse and of the Schools

Dr. Mac Cabe reports, however, that the Hospital Ward cannot be considered as presenting

a satisfactory appearance as to cleanliness, and that they much require limewashing and painting:

D<sup>r</sup> Mac Cule further reports that the floor of the male accident ward is in a very defective condition and should be boarded, and that the Work-house buildings require to be painted externally and internally:

The L<sup>y</sup> Board forward a Specification for the painting which may be adopted by the Guardians when they enter into a contract for the execution of the work.

The L<sup>y</sup> B<sup>d</sup> forward at the same time extracts from D<sup>r</sup> Mac Cule's report relating to the financial condition of the Union, the insufficient Hospital accommodation, and the crowded state of the Female Lunatic Department; and they desire to refer to the circumstance that the representations of Doctor Mac Cule in regard to these matters have been, on previous occasions urged upon the consideration of the Guardians, and the L<sup>y</sup> B<sup>d</sup> request that they may now receive early and serious attention:

The Guardians having taken the above letter into consideration desire to express their regret that the Inspector, D<sup>r</sup> Mac Cule, should consider that the recommendations so often urged have been overlooked as regard the accommodation for hospital patients; As a fact the House is licensed for 669 persons and at the present date there are only 369 inmates, there having been a steady decrease in proportion to decrease of population; The large proportion of sick to healthy necessitated the alteration and improvement of some of the wards which was carried out last year at an expense of about £900; and under the circumstances the Guardians consider it would not be just to the ratepayers to enter into any scheme of building additional wards:
