her recent severe work. She left here on December 28th, and I  
would suggest that the Board grant her permission to remain  
away for a month from that date. I retained temporary Nurse  
Hone during her absence. Ward Attendant Ellen Fogarty, who  
contracted influenza and pneumonia and was granted a month's  
leave, did not return for five weeks. She informs me that her  
health did not permit her to do so. Considering her severe  
attack I have no reason to doubt her statement.

I beg to report that the nursing staff and Hospital  
officials who are applying for a bonus as a recognition of the  
exceptionally severe work done by them during the recent epidemic,  
are worthy of the highest praise. As most of the members of the  
Board are aware, there was a very large percentage of pneumonic  
cases; these cases required constant care by night and day. The  
members of the nursing staff are Nurses O'Beirne, Byrne, O'Meara  
and Carroll. The ward attendants are Patrick Turner and Ellen  
Fogarty. James Reilly, <sup>Ambulance Driver,</sup> is also deserving of the highest praise.  
He was constantly on the road and had repeatedly to carry patients  
from most inaccessible places.

ORDER :— One month's leave to be granted to Nurse  
O'Beirne as recommended; continued employment of Nurse Hone  
approved, at £1-11s-6d a week, with 12s. weekly in lieu of  
rations and 2s 6d weekly laundry expenses. The additional leave  
in the case of Miss Fogarty also approved. - J.B.

The Master reports that the Matron resumed duty on 30th December.

The Wardmistress, Miss Ellen Fogarty, resumed duty on 10th inst. Mrs Driver who was doing duty for her left on the same date.

Nurses Neary and Leland, who were doing duty in the Fever Hospital, became ill on the 4th December and left, and on the requisition of the Medical Officer the Master secured the services of Nurse Williams who took up duty on 11th December.

Nurse O'Beirne went on leave on 27th December, and on the requisition of the Medical Officer the Master continued the services of Nurse Hone.

Major Tottenham, of Woodstock, forwarded £1 for the purpose of giving the Workhouse children a Christmas treat. Same was very much appreciated.

The Master respectfully suggests that the Guardians would send out to nurse two orphan boys named Dunne, who are at present in the House.

Since last meeting it was necessary to order some locks, bolts, screws, nails, etc., for carpenter.

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

Read letter No. 61,057-8/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from same, acknowledging receipt of replies to inquiries respecting the temporary employment of Mary Kennedy and Bride Claire as wardsmaids in the Workhouse, and stating that the Local Government Board had sanctioned the proposed payment of remuneration at the rate of One Pound a week in each case. The date upon which the latter ceased to act should be carefully recorded on the Guardians' minutes.

The Master of the Workhouse certified that Bride Claire might be paid for her services as attendant up to 17th December. He also certified that Katie Murtagh might be paid for acting as attendant up to 21st December.

Read letter No. 57,408/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from the Local Government Board, referring to minutes of the meeting of the Guardians on 25th November last, and stating that they had sanctioned the payment of remuneration to Mrs Driver for her services as temporary substitute for Miss Fogarty, attendant, and for the Matron of the Workhouse, at the rate of each of these officers' salaries, respectively.

Read letter No. 60,118/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from same, referring to minutes of the meeting of the Guardians on 9th idem, and stating that the Local Government Board had sanctioned the payment of remuneration at the rate of the Matron's salary to Miss Hanniffy for her services as temporary Matron of the Workhouse.

Read circular No. 61,878/1918, dated 23rd December, 1918, from same, intimating that the Local Government Board were now, in conjunction with the Treasury, prepared to consider applications from local authorities for permission to raise loans in order to enable them to put into operations schemes of public utility which were of urgent importance. The Treasury drew attention to the impossibility of providing any large sums from Public

Read letter No. 21, 087-8/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from same, acknowledging receipt of copies to 1 parties requesting the temporary employment of Miss Hanniffy and Miss O'Brien as workmen in the workhouse, and stating that the Local Government Board had sanctioned the proposed payment of remuneration at the rate of one pound a week in each case. The date upon which the latter ceased to not should be carefully recorded on the Guardians' minutes.

The Master of the Workhouse certified that Miss O'Brien should be paid for her services as attendant up to 17th December. He also certified that Miss Hanniffy might be paid for being an attendant up to 21st December.

Read letter No. 27, 100/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from the Local Government Board, referring to minutes of the meeting of the Guardians on 19th November last, and stating that they had sanctioned the payment of remuneration to Mrs. O'Brien for her services as temporary substitute for Miss Hanniffy, attendant, and for the Master of the Workhouse, at the rate of each of these officers, a week, respectively.

Read letter No. 25, 115/1918, dated 21st December, 1918, from same, referring to minutes of the meeting of the Guardians on 21st Nov, and stating that the Local Government Board had sanctioned the payment of remuneration at the rate of the Master's salary to Miss Hanniffy for her services as temporary Master of the workhouse.

Read circular No. 21, 878/1918, dated 20th December, 1918, from same, intimating that the Local Government Board were now, in conjunction with the Treasury, prepared to consider applications from local authorities for permission to raise loans in order to enable them to put into operation schemes of public utility which were of urgent importance. The Treasury drew attention to the responsibility of providing any large sums from public

Funds, and stated that it would not be possible at present to consider applications for loans from that source except in the case of the smaller authorities for very urgent services, and then only to very limited total amount. With this exception it was essential that the necessary loans should be raised locally by the Authorities concerned. It was further added that, except in cases where the works were of pressing necessity for reasons of public health, the Local Government Board were required to refer the case to the Treasury before giving their sanction to the necessary loan.

Read letter No. 57,406/1918, dated 8th January, 1919, from same, stating that the Local Government Board had had before them the resolution adopted by the Board of Guardians at the meeting on 25th November last proposing to increase the salary of Miss Mary F. Byrne, Assistant Nurse in the Workhouse, from £35 to £50 per annum. The Local Government Board stated that they were not prepared to sanction, at the present time, so large an increase, which was equivalent to about 43% on her salary, but they would sanction an increase of £10 a year, thereby bringing her salary up to £45 per annum.

Read letter No. 1077/1919, dated 11th January, 1919, from same, acknowledging receipt of replies to inquiries respecting the temporary employment of John Driver as porter in the Workhouse. The Local Government Board stated that they had sanctioned the proposed payment of remuneration at the rate of £1 a week to Mr Driver for his services from 18th October to 4th November last, with rations and necessaries to the estimated weekly value of £1-1s-2d. The date upon which he ceased to act should be recorded

and stated that it would not be possible to present to  
consider applications for loans from that source except in the  
case of the smaller authorities for very urgent services, and  
then only to very limited extent. With this exception it  
was essential that the necessary loans should be raised locally  
by the authorities concerned. It was further added that, except  
in cases where the works were of pressing necessity for reasons  
of public health, the Local Government Board were required to  
refer the case to the Treasury before giving their sanction  
to the necessary loan.

but they would sanction an increase of £10 a year, thereby  
bringing her salary up to £35 per annum.

There is a large number of female patients in the Infirmary in one ward and there are only four beds available for eight children.

In the wards of the Fever Hospital there are many indications of dampness, and in order to provide a remedy the front wall and the southern gable wall should be cemented, as has been done in the case of the Infirmary.

The water supply of the Fever Hospital has to be carried from a tap in the water main about forty yards distant from the building. Owing to the War, the Rural District Council have been unable to proceed with the scheme which they promoted for an improved water supply for the district, including the Workhouse.

The supply of clothing and bedding and bedsteads in the main building is good, but it would be desirable that some of the bedsteads not in use should be transferred to the Fever Hospital and that some of the old hair mattresses should be teased and re-made.

I would recommend that the boiler in the laundry should be repaired so that a supply of hot water may be available for the washing troughs and for bathing purposes.

In order that the children attending school in the town may have a better lunch I would suggest that the quantities of bread prescribed in diets No. 7 and 8 of the dietary scale previous to its alteration, should be allowed.

There are a few girls in the Workhouse between 15 and 16 years of age who should be sent out to service.

The Motor Ambulance has proved a great boon to the sick poor of the Union.

Portions of the Institution are in need of painting and distemping.

The Visiting Committee does not meet and report as required by Article 59 of the Workhouse.

The following letters and other communications were sent by the Clerk and District Clerk to the Board of Health on the 10th day of March, 1919.

Read letter dated March 10th, 1919, from Dr. Louis Binns, Medical Officer of Newmarket Dispensary District, stating that, having seen the report in the newspapers relative to the proposed establishment of a Dispensary in Wilcocks, he wishes to say, that while approving of the project additional traveling expenses will be incurred in attending it. Under the circumstances he considers it would be only fair and reasonable that the Guardians should bear this additional cost, which he estimates will amount to \$15 a week.

Read letter dated March 10th, 1919, from Mrs. A. W. Binns, Wilcocks, stating that she will give room for Dispensary, also accommodation for people waiting on doctor, and supply fuel and attendance, but not an estimated for seven shillings per week.

Order - Both these letters to be considered at next meeting. Notice to be placed on agenda. W. E. [unclear]

Read letter dated March 10th, 1919, from the District of Newmarket Dispensary District, drawing attention to the fact that at a meeting of the Guardians last September they granted an increase of salary \$10:00 per year, and stating that she has not received it.

Read letter dated March 10th, 1919, from Believing Officer, stating that on March 10th she had notice to pay on Friday the 15th and again on Friday the 15th that she was still ill and unable to resume duty, and appointed [unclear] to continue duty in the Wilcocks District until further notice. Order - approved - W. E. [unclear]

Read letter from same, of same date, stating that, Dr McCormack notified her on Saturday evening the 22nd inst, that he was ill and unable to attend to duty, and requesting her to provide a Doctor for the Wicklow District .

R.O. Byrne interviewed Dr Lumley( who is doing duty at present in Wicklow for Dr Lyndon ). He could not undertake Dr McCormack's duties, but arranged with Dr McCormack to attend any urgent calls he might get .

If Dr McCormack is not able to resume duty on that day he will send word to the Board room .

Read letter from Dr McCormack to R.O. Byrne, stating that he is not able to resume duty, on that day Monday, and Dr Lumley goes away that evening, so it will be necessary to appoint some one .

Dr Lumley attended to anything urgent since .

Order - Dr Doyle, Avoca to be appointed at the remuneration of £7 : 7 : 0 , per week - W. B. 24/3/1919 .

Read letter dated 24th March, 1919, from Dr McCormack, tendering his resignation as temporary Medical Officer of the Wicklow Dispensary District . Continuance in the Office might mean compulsion to render services to an element in the town that have recently been guilty of the most inhuman and cowardly conduct in their vicious methods of intimidation and attempt to cut off food supplies to a Community of defenceless women and children .

He will therefore be much obliged to the Guardians if they will appoint a successor as soon as possible, particularly as he is laid up at present with a bad cold and will be unable to undertake Dispensary duty for some time .

He states he will report when fit to resume duty.

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Read letter from same, stating that in consequence of not being able to secure any information as to whether Dr Ryan was in the Rathdrum District on the 4th and there being some urgent cases of septic pneumonia to be attended to, he wired to Dr McDermott to see these cases. He considers that the milage covered in visiting these cases was probably 24.

Read letter dated 24th March, 1919, from Dr E.C. McDermott, Rathdrum, stating that on Tuesday March 4th, Dr Garland who was confined to bed suffering from acute Influenza, wired him to do duty in Barndarrig; he guaranteed all expenses.

Dr McDermott spent practically the whole day there and did not leave until late at night. On Thursday March 6th Mr Timothy Lenihan brought him out to attend a very bad district case (Mrs Doyle beside the creamery) he guaranteed expenses if they were not paid by the Guardians. When in the district on that day (Thursday) he attended numerous ticket calls for Dr Garland. From Tuesday until Friday neither Dr Garland, Mr Lenihan, Father Clarke or apparently any of the people were aware that any arrangement had been made for the carrying on of duty, and during this time many District calls were arriving at Dr Garland's house. Dr McDermott enclosed bill for motor hire which is £5. for two long days, but probably £4. might be accepted.

There is a necessity for legislation to deal with such emergencies, and I consider that a Medical Officer of Health should be empowered to report such cases to the police who should have authority to requisition adequate supplies from different farmers in rotation, and cause this to be exposed for sale at some shop in the district. I regret to have to lay such stress on the above three points, but their bearing on the Poor Law Medical Officer is so obvious that it becomes a public duty to emphasise them.

She applied for an outfit of clothing for her. They lived in a very nice neighbourhood and she did not want the girl to be shabby, and the foster mother was a very poor waoman.

Read report from Miss Browne, Local Government Inspector, as follows :-

Nurse Child Mary Kelly. - This girl would appear to be nearly 15 years of age. She has passed the second stage of the 5th Standard in education and is well grown and healthy.

Her foster mother does not appear to be in very comfortable circumstances, and is therefore not a suitable person to be allowed to adopt the girl.

I would strongly recommend that the girl should be hired out with Mrs Thornton, Postmistress of Newcastle. The girl has now been working with Mrs Thornton - after school hours - for the past two months. Mrs Thornton is anxious to hire out the girl and train her as a domestic servant. She will give her £8 for the first year and is willing to sign the Hiring Out Agreement.

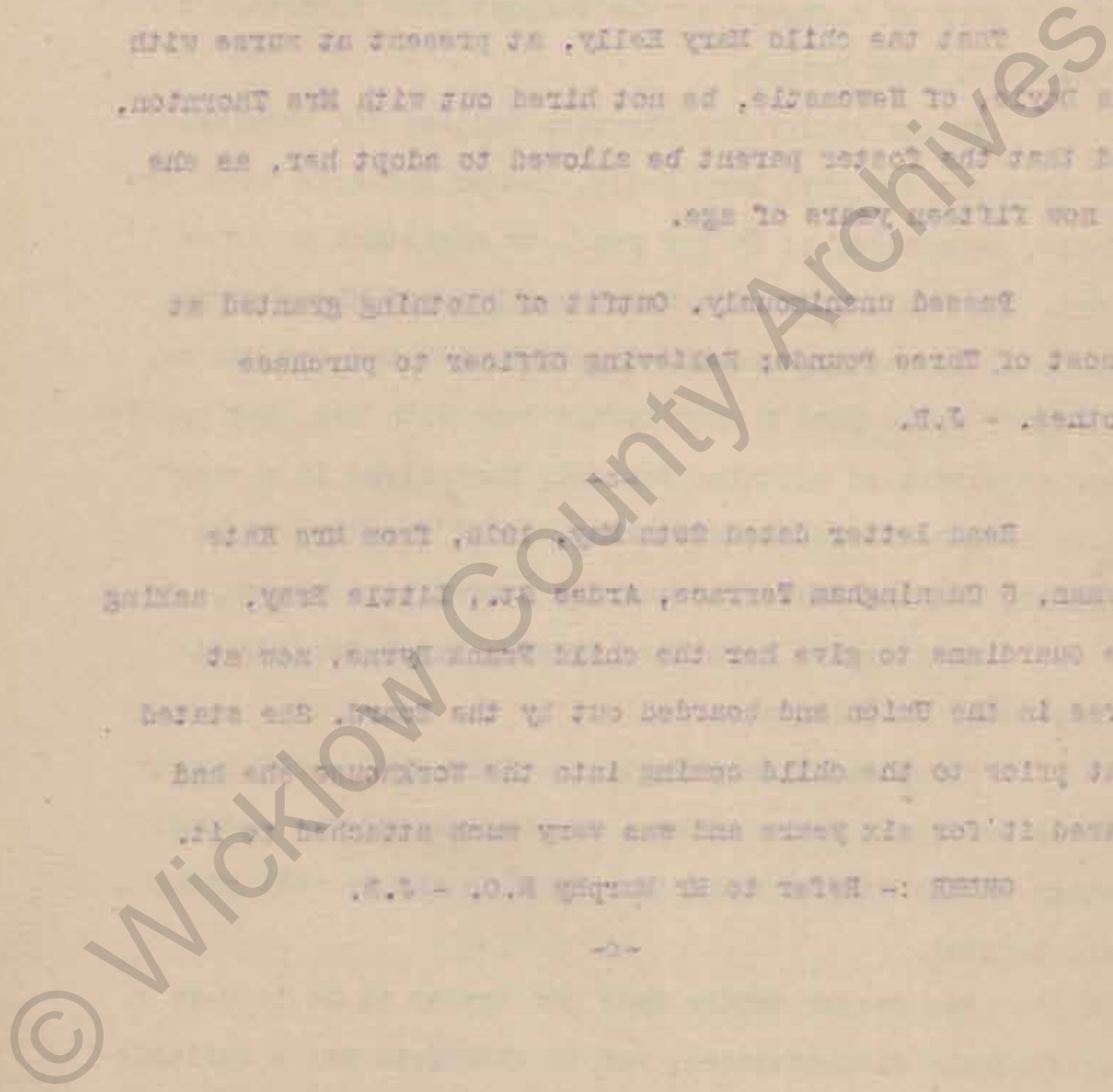

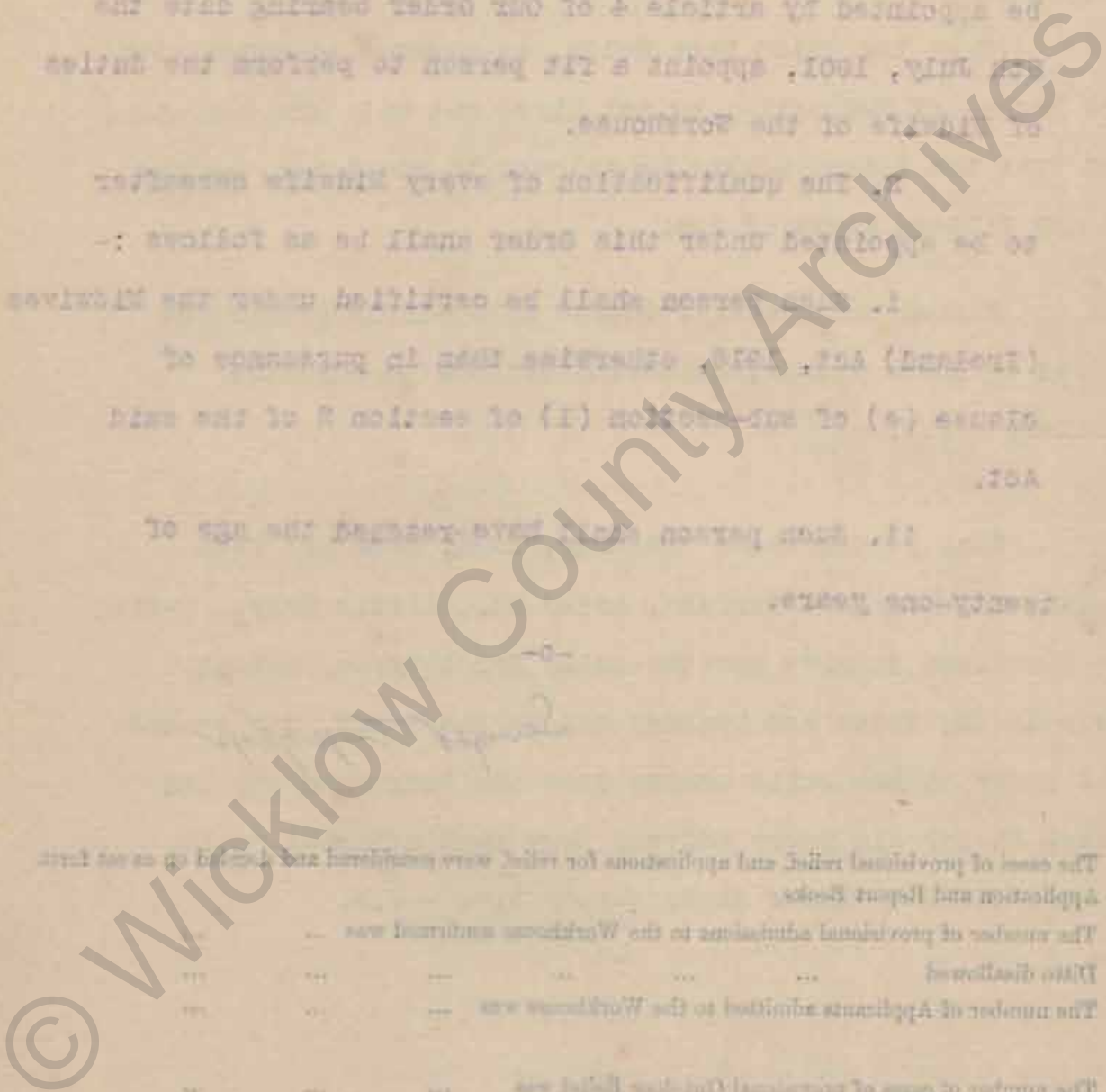
