Read the following Report of the Committee appointed to consider the Water supply of the town of Rathdrum

"The Committee consisting partly of members of your Board and partly of residents in the town of Rathdrum to examine and report on the plans for the supply of Water to the upper and lower parts of the town respectively met on Friday the 25<sup>th</sup> of July, and accompanied by Mr Little proceeded to examine the works ~~commenced~~ by the Engineer at the upper reservoir:

"These works consist of a trench cut across the hill, above the present reservoir and show a fair run of water which apparently was not previously made available; Mr Little however cannot say positively that it would be sufficient to meet the increased demand for water should the upper part of the town be permitted to draw from the same source as the Workhouse and the Fair Green; and it must not be forgotten that this has been by no means a dry season and that the month of September is the time of year when the force of springs can be most effectively tested.

Mr Little's estimate for a supply to the main street from this source including street pipes &c amounts to about £600; a sum too large in the opinion of your Committee to warrant the sanction of your Board except under a reasonable certainty of the source being permanent, and ample for both the Workhouse and for the town; and consequently think it prudent to defer any report on this portion of the subject referred to their consideration until the middle of the month of September.

Your Committee visited the site of the proposed cistern for the supply of the Lower Street and had the pleasure of explaining the plans &c. to Mr Hill who expressed himself as anxious to promote anything

that would tend to the health and convenience of his neighbours provided that his own household arrangements be not unduly interfered with;

It was eventually agreed that the pipe from the cistern to the proposed fountain in the Lower street should be not half an inch, which Mr. Little considers quite large enough, and with this modification Mr. Hill declared himself willing to withdraw his opposition and expressed himself satisfied: This will reduce the cost of the work by about £8.

It is believed that Mr. J. P. Saul will also acquiesce in the plan as amended; and if this be the case your Committee sees no reason why this scheme should not at once be proceeded with.

Matthew Lawler was brought to the Union by an Officer of the Birmingham Union on the 19<sup>th</sup> of September, and left on discharge in a few minutes. He returned on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October and left again on the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. He was passed up to the House on the 2<sup>nd</sup> instant, and in my absence was sent to sleep in the Infirmary ward where he had been a Ward attendant previous to his going to England. Next day I directed him to go to the healthy inmates ward, as I did not intend to place him in the position of a Ward attendant again. In this ward a number of harmless imbeciles, about 8, slept in consequence of no room in their department, but which has been remedied by the addition of a new ward to same as recommended by H L Robinson Esq Esq, the said new ward has been occupied by those Imbeciles since the 12<sup>th</sup> instant; The healthy ward was not occupied by any sick to cause any unpleasant effect, neither did I notice any as I inspected same each night between 8 and 9 o'clock. The bed in the Infirmary ward alluded to was clean in all respects.
