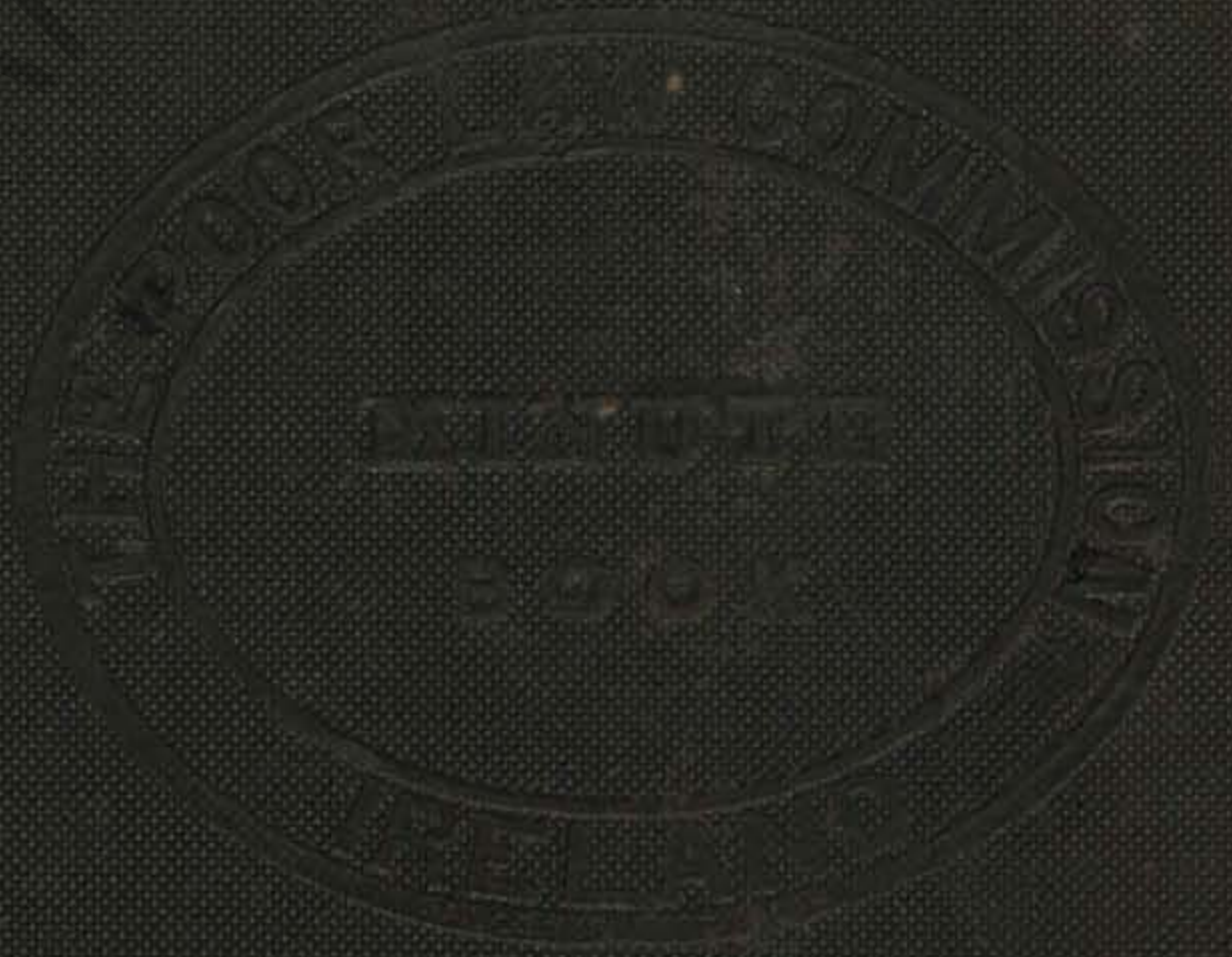

Circular N^o 36 d^d 64 Dated 12th Inst informing the Clerk that the Commissioners had forwarded 200 Copies of the Notices of Election for Guardians

Letter N^o 2912 Dated 13th Instant with reference to a Resolution of the Guardians, on the 9th Instant adopting the suggestion contained in a Report of the Committee of the Board adopted to inspect the Workhouse with a view to suggesting the means of providing a Clothes Store, Male Bath Room and boys day Room, in reference thereto the Commissioners state that there is no objection to the old Clothes Store being converted into a Male Bath Room as suggested, or to the removal of the Tailors and Shoemakers to the Schoolmaster Room which are now unoccupied and to the present Tailors Shop being used as a boys day Room subject to the arrangements made by the Guardians leaving the boys the use of the present Schoolroom except when it is used for Religious purposes.

The proposal however to lengthen the screen across the Boys School Room is very objectionable - when it is closed it will divide the Room into two parts leaving the only fire place in this Room in the portion the Master wishes to appropriate as an office, If the screen is left open

When the boys use their present Schoolroom there will be no provision in the part used as an Office and if it is closed the boys will be deprived of their fire, and their Comfort will be sacrificed to the Convenience of the Master.

Under these Circumstances the Commissioners cannot sanction the proposed alteration in the Schoolroom.

Order on the above Letter

As the alterations recommended were in a forward state and as the Guardians are of opinion that such is very desirable we beg to refer the matter to Captain Robinson at his next inspection with a view to a satisfactory arrangement.

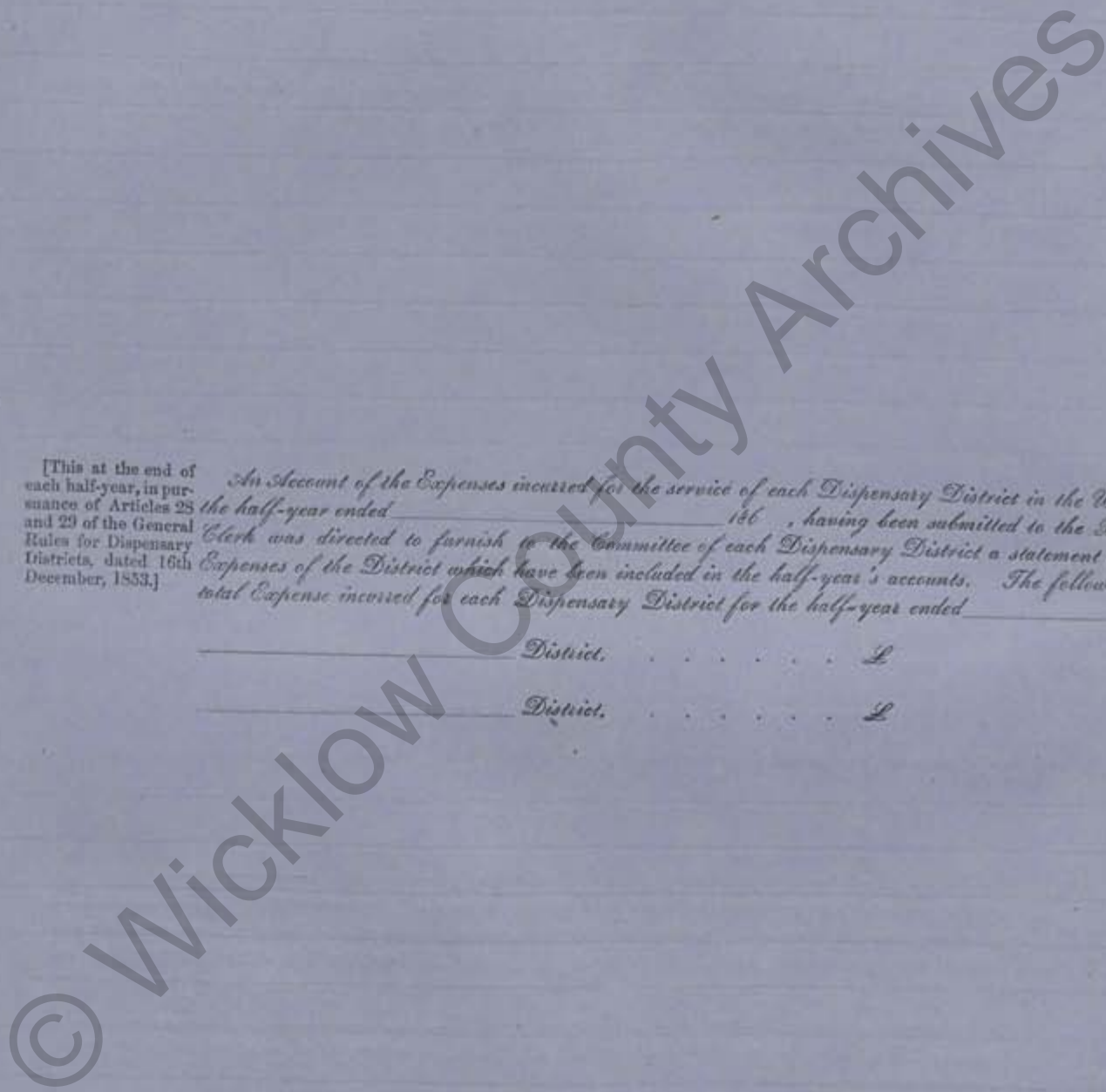

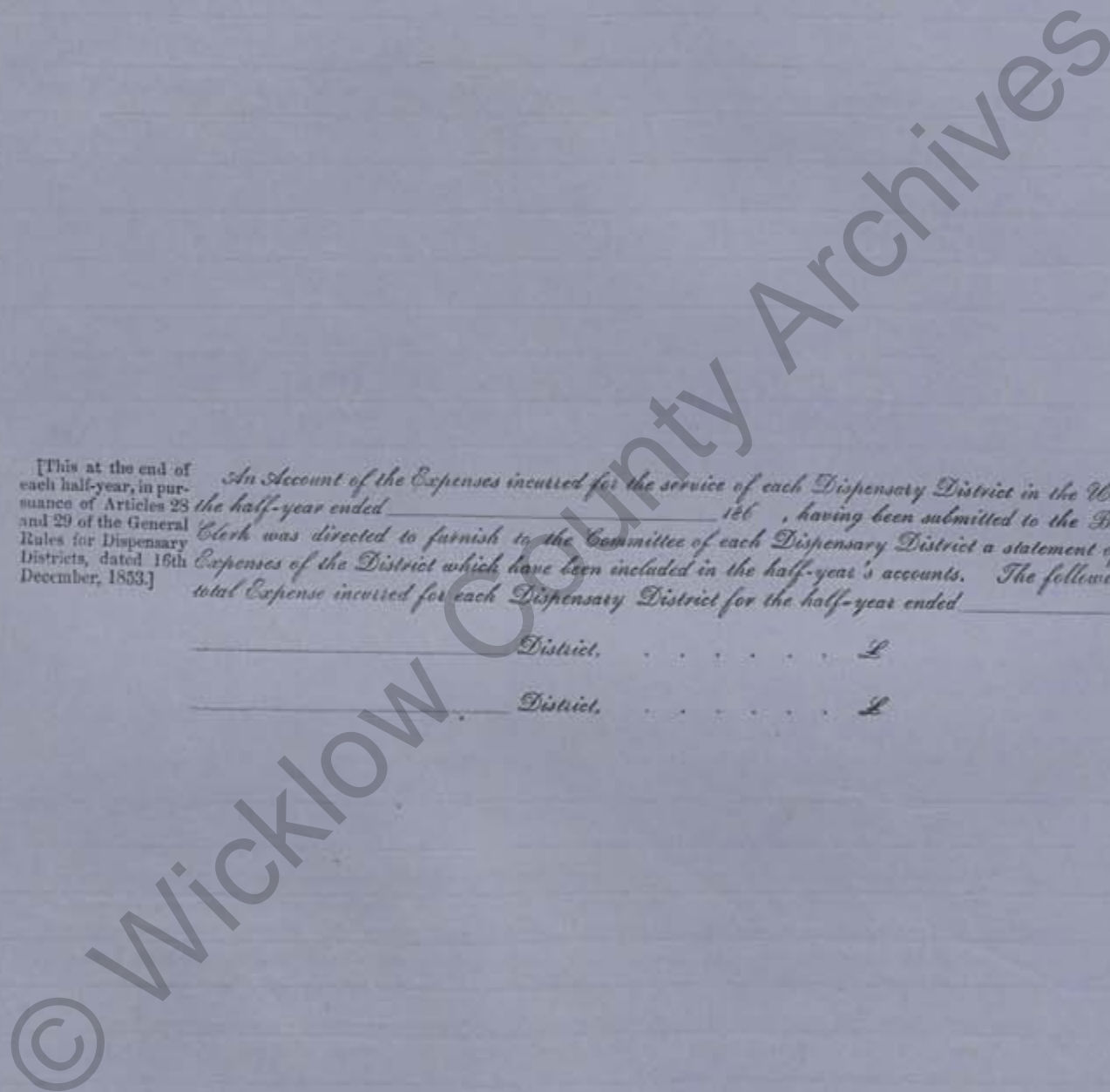

In reference thereto the Commissioners state that they are informed by Mr Robinson that he went to Ruthden on the 12th Ultimo for the purpose of conferring with the Guardians on the subject of the proposed alterations but that a sufficient number of Guardians did not attend to form a Board. Mr Robinson however examined the School room with reference to the proposed screen and thinks it very objectionable as its effect will be to deprive the occupants of the room of the benefit of the fire, while the arrangement is one from which the Master and his Assistants will alone derive advantage.

The Commissioners at the same time state that the Guardians should not make any alterations in the Workhouse Buildings without previously obtaining the sanction of the

Commissioners, and in the present instance there was not in the opinion of the Commissioners the least occasion for commencing the work in such a hurry. The Master Moreover had no reason to anticipate that the Commissioners would approve of the alteration, as he was well aware that Mr Robinson considered it objectionable, and when he applied to Mr Robinson to recommend it, the latter distinctly refused to do so, under these circumstances the work should not have been pressed forward with such unnecessary haste before the Commissioners could have had time to communicate with the funders on the subject.

The Commissioners accordingly must decline to sanction the arrangement and they request that if the screen has been put up across the school it may be removed.

From information I received from one of the Paupers named John Sutton and other Sources I had information taken out against a Pauper inmate named Alexander Procter who was committed to Wicklow Goal on the evening of the 25th Instant

The Children were clean and orderly and the School room the most comfortable and best appointed I have hitherto seen in an Workhouse.
