Under all circumstances, together with the fact that there is no other male officer to take charge in my absence, and matters that have occurred of late with reference to the Paupers clothes store, I feel that I could not withhold this report, or any longer take on myself to be responsible for the duties connected with the Porter;

The Porter having been called before the Board and the above report read to him he stated in reply that he had leave of absence for the day, and having received his pension he drank too much. —
