The Board had been specially summoned to consider letter from the Department of Local Government, No. 8790/21, dated 3rd August, 1921, as follows:—

■ The Ministry for Local Government have had before them the minutes of proceedings of the Board of Guardians of Rathdrum Union on the 11th ultimo, when the Guardians decided to adhere to the decision not to pay the substitutes for Medical Officers while on leave this year, and the Ministry request that the Guardians will be good enough to take this matter again into consideration. The Medical Officers are entitled to vacation as a right according to the terms of their appointments, and the Guardians cannot alter the terms of the appointment without the Medical Officers' consent.

The proposed Committee would consist of ten members appointed by the County Council; two members to be appointed by each of the following Boards of Guardians, namely, Baltinglass, Rathdrum and Shillelagh, and one member appointed by each of the following Boards of Guardians, namely, Rathdown and Naas. The County Council desired that the Board of Guardians would appoint their representatives on the Committee and forward the names and addresses to the County Secretary so that he might convene the first meeting of the proposed body at an early date. The letter also asked for particulars of all expenditure incurred by the Guardians annually, including maintenance of the Workhouse, Fever Hospital, etc., and Outdoor Relief.

Read further letter from same, dated 22nd September, 1921, stating that since the issue of the circular on the subject of Workhouse Amalgamation he had been directed by the Local Government Department to ask for detailed information on the points covered by the questions in enclosed sheets. 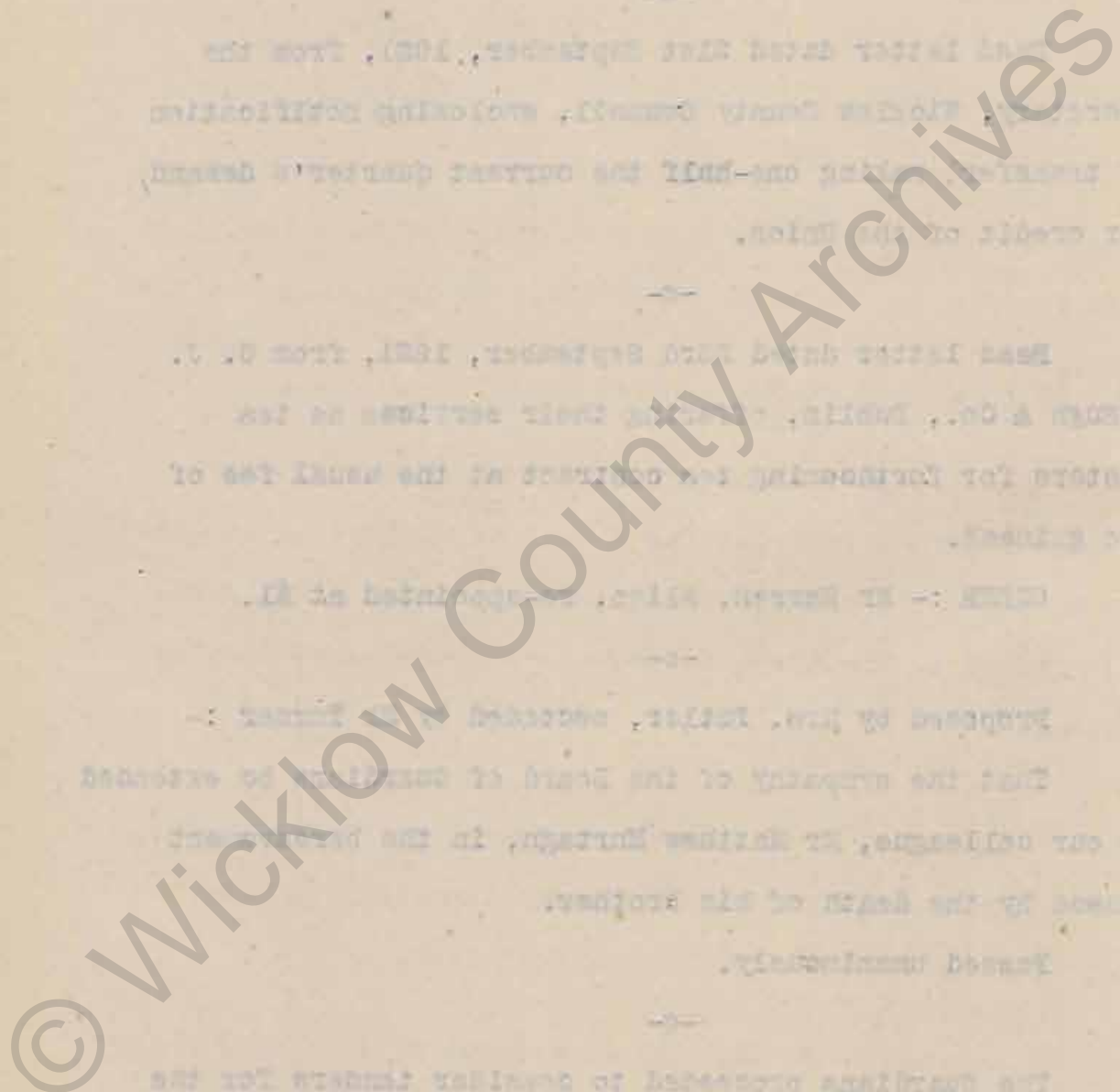

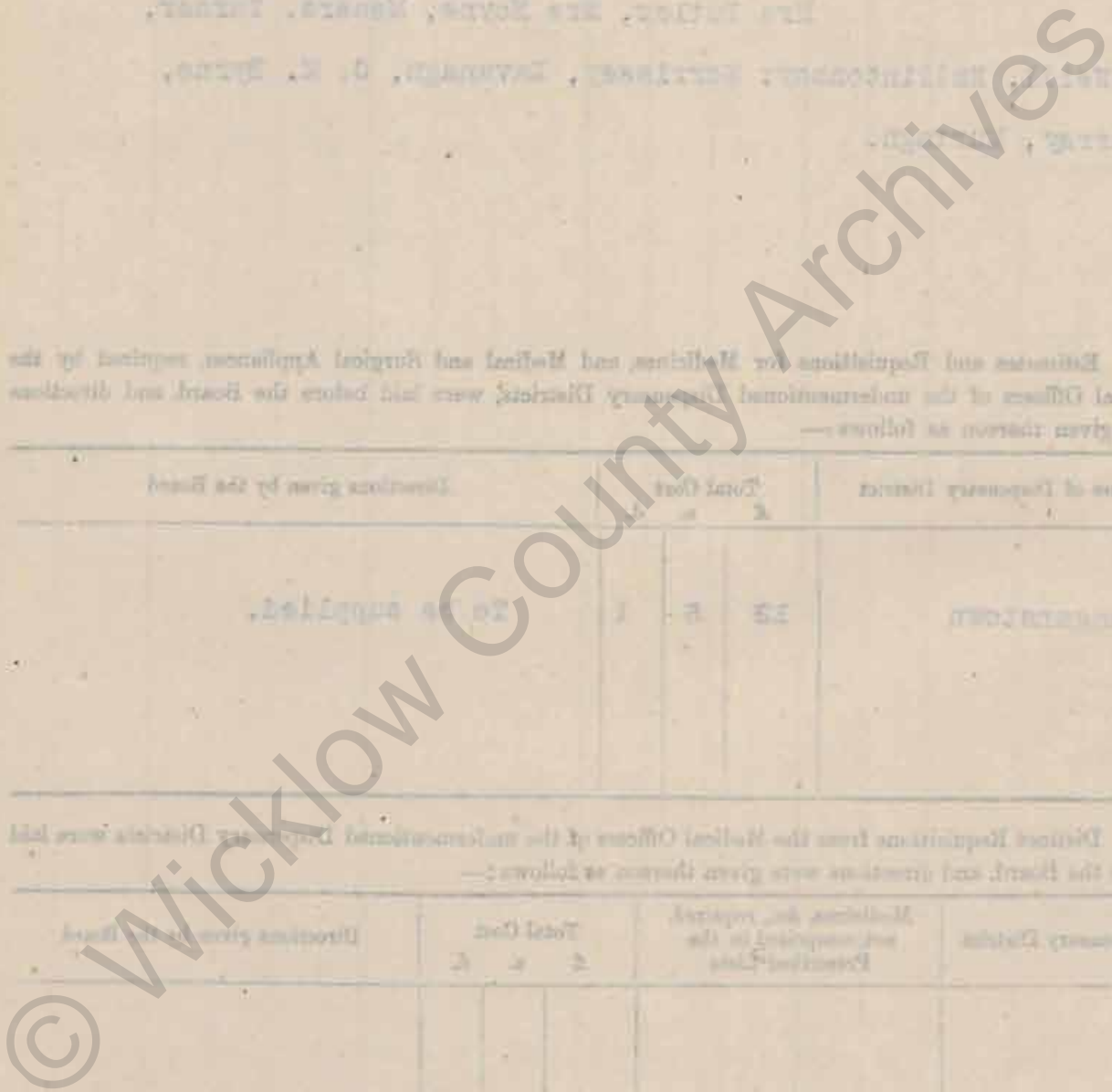

The schemes must go through. The local representatives who neglect or refuse to co-operate must take primary responsibility to those who elected them for obstructing schemes recommended by a Department of the Government to which they owed allegiance. Whole time permanent officials under the existing system who lose employment as a result of these schemes of reform may have a maximum of 50 per cent of their actual number of years service added for the purpose of computing their retiring allowances, and these allowances will be computed strictly in accordance with section 8 of the Proportional Representation Act, 1919, which has been adopted by the Department.

The following Letters from the Local Government ~~Board~~ for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

Read letter dated 16th December, 1921, No. 19525/21, from the Department of Local Government, enclosing copy of letter dated 10th instant received in that Department from John Burke, a patient in the Infirmary attached to Rathdrum Workhouse, and asking to have the Guardians' observations on the complaints made therein.

In his letter John Burke stated that he had been admitted on 2th July and had never been examined by a Doctor or treated for any complaint. He was suffering from a bad stomach and when he complained to the Doctor no notice was taken of him. The Shillelagh inmates were being removed there now, so the place was overcrowded and the Doctor had ordered him out. He was not able to go out as he felt very weak and he demanded to be examined by a Doctor to prove his statements. He complained that the patients on milk diet, he was one himself, very seldom got it at night. On 2th, 29th and 30th November they got none, and on 1st December half a pint at night, and on several occasions when they got it, it was half water or sour. As far as he could see the Head Nurse was the Doctor; if patients made a complaint they were threatened to be put out. There was one particular old man in the Ward and the Head Nurse nor Doctor never went near him, a poor, helpless old man. There was a Visiting Committee appointed by the Board of Guardians but they never visited the Hospital at all to see how the patients were treated. There was nothing there day after day but complaints.

The Master of the Workhouse stated that Burke had left the institution some time ago.

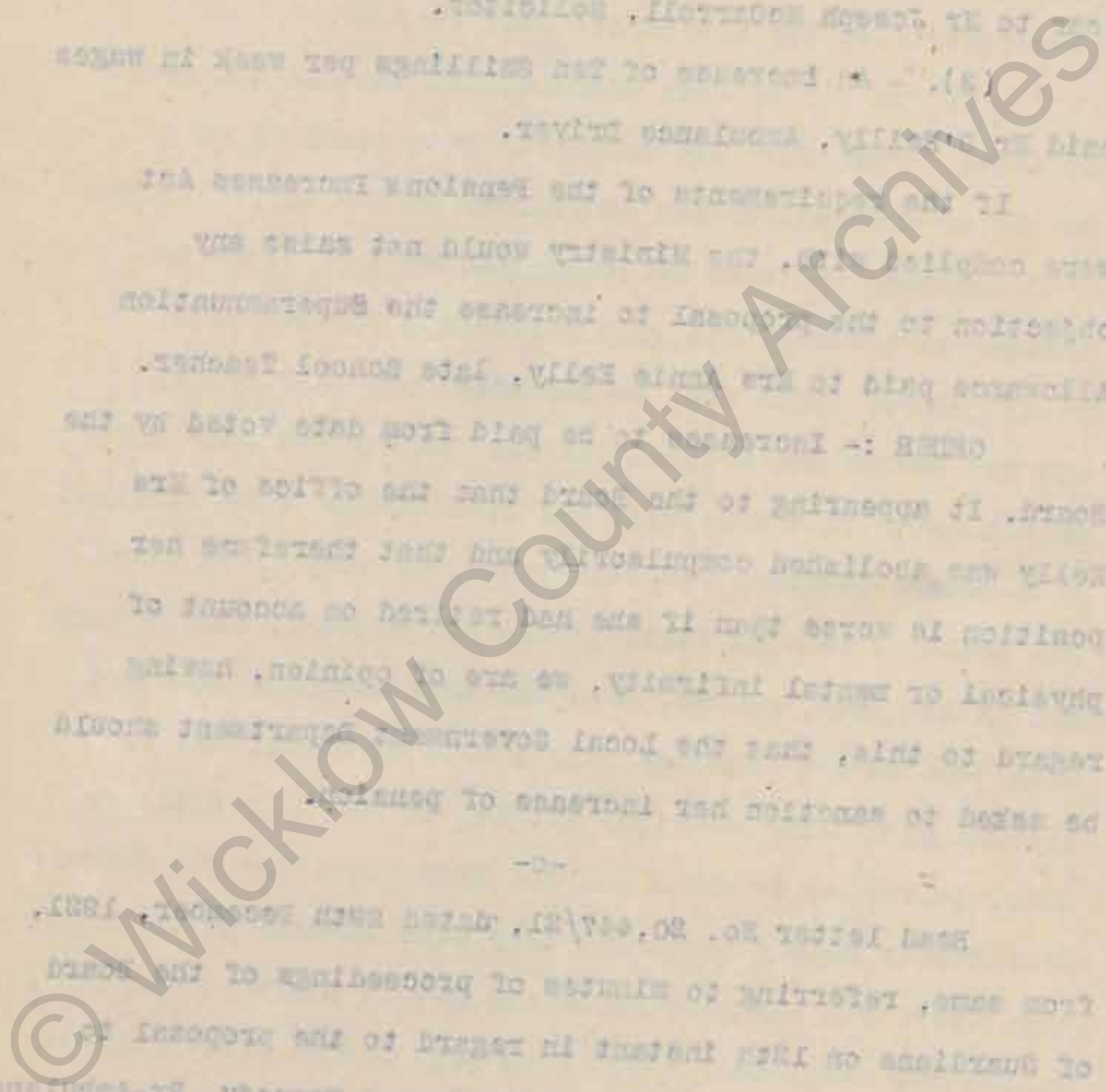

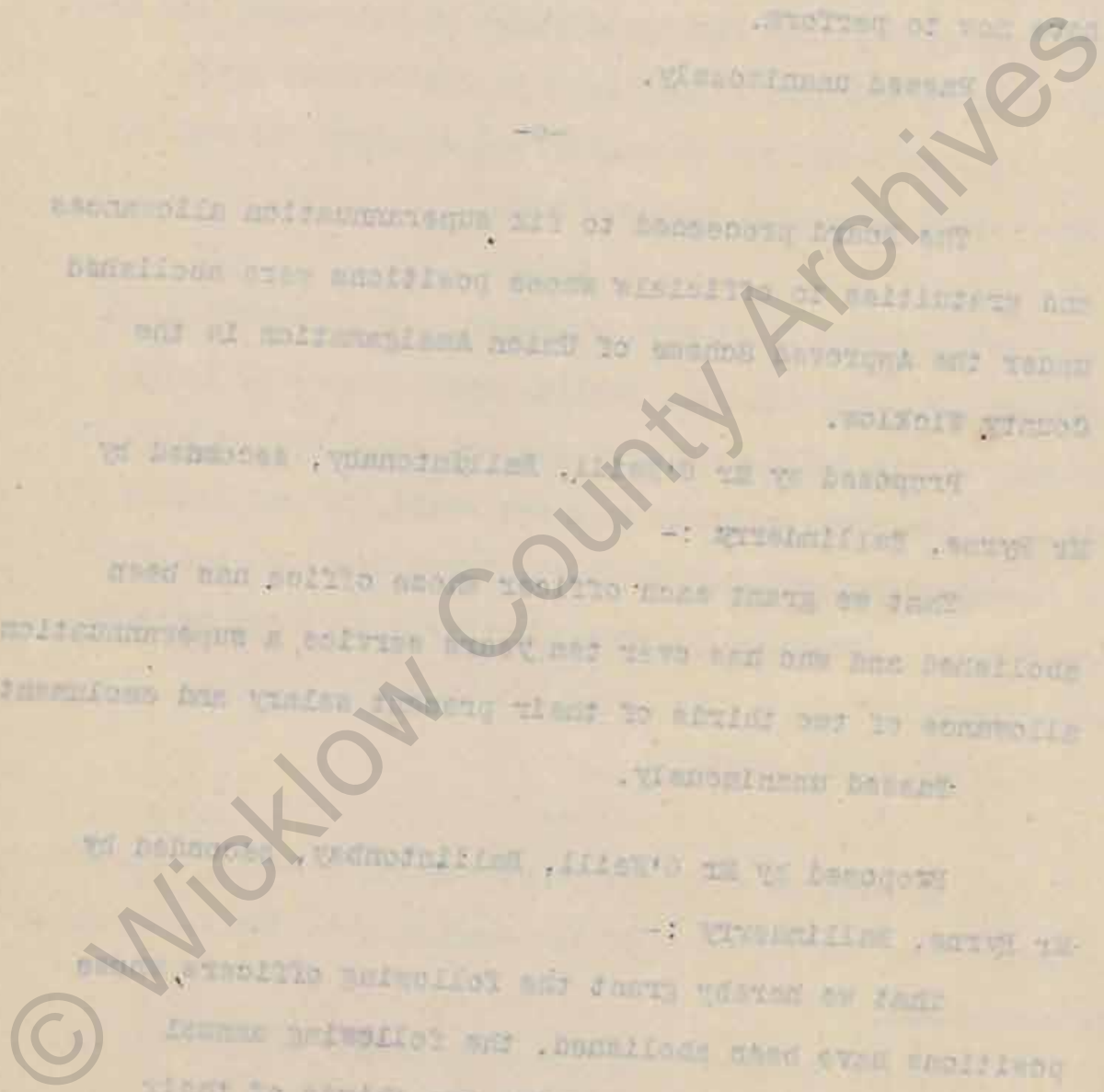

She asked that the Department point out to the Guardians that their attitude seemed inconsistent and ensure that Mrs Redmond procured her leave, of which she was in great need as she had no holiday for four years.
