Read letter from Mr. Brett C.E. in reference to the report of the Local Govern't Bonds Office, Mr. Barney; relative to the drainage of the village of Kilpedder. — Mr. Brett states that he approves of the suggestion of Mr. Barney regarding the necessity of filtering the sewage water, after it passes the proposed Ceppools, which Mr. Brett is prepared to carry out without incurring a greater expense than provided in his estimate —

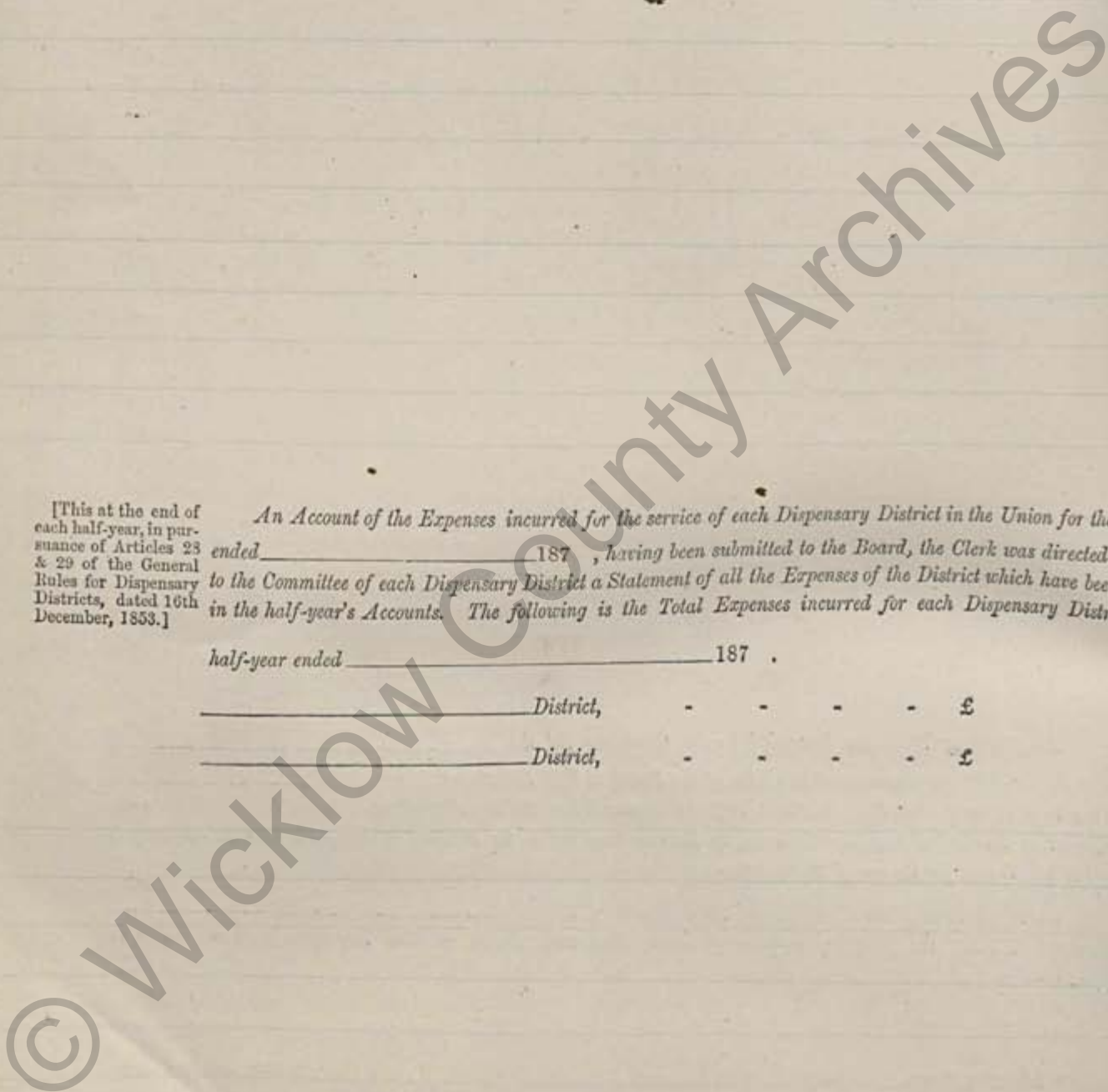

In reference to the above report the Guardians seem to observe that it is not a plan for a general supply of the town, but only for supplying drinking fountains; any general plan involving a larger expenditure

the Guardians consider the Commissioners should obtain power to carry out, subject to the approval of the Local Government Board.

The Guardians desire to call the attention of the Local Government Board to the fact that a certain amount of expenditure has already been incurred by the Town Commissioners, and that under Sec 7 of the 37 + 38 Vic C 93, their powers still continue; and that the Commissioners are willing to complete the Willlow Waterworks.

Should this power not exist the Board of Guardians strongly urge on the Local Government Board the recommendation of the Committee with regard to obtaining an act of Parliament to give them the necessary power, as they possess ample means of carrying out the requisite works without additional taxation, if their power to expend those funds in the manner proposed were conferred on them.
