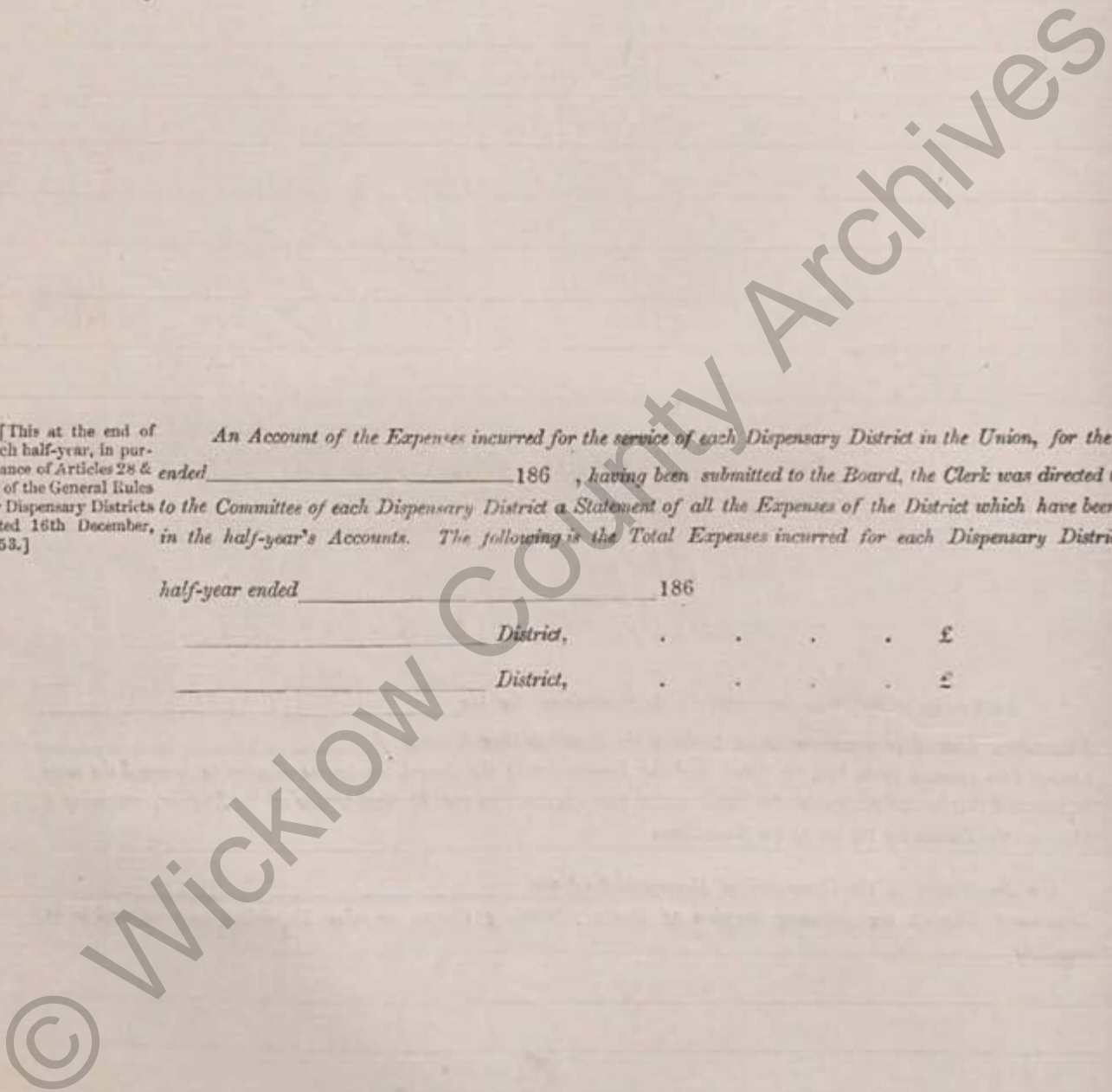

Railway Co stating, in reply to a letter received from the Clerk of the Union, that he had caused strict enquiry to be made as to the state of the house in question, which he states is a large roomy one and amply sufficient for the accommodation of the people occupying it; He further states that it is supposed that the small pox was brought into the house by a child who had been in a Dublin Hospital for another complaint, and that three other children caught the infection, all of whom have been removed to Hospital.

Orders that the Nuisance Inspector shall make a minute inspection of the premises in question in company with the Medical Officer of the District, and if it is found on inspection that the Medical Officer can certify that the house is in a state injurious to the health of the inmates or neighbours, the owner of the house to be summoned before the Magistrates.

Gentlemen

I have to report that a prisoner named Mary Fosse has taken Small pox, she had been in Fever Hospital with her Infant, which had measles, and in a few days after being discharged, she complained of not feeling well, she was at once removed to Fever Hospital as a precaution, at which time the symptoms of small pox had not manifested themselves, all necessary steps have been taken now as well as before as a preventative of the disease, by the use of Carbo Acid, Chloride of Lime, and burning of sulphur throughout the different yards and departments of the Workhouse, and I trust under Providence we shall be kept free from this disease as hitherto.

A case was admitted ^{to Hospital} from the Town of Rathdrum on the 11th Inst, and died on the 14th Inst, it was contracted by the patient in connection with a bad case at Rosindown, I understand that the patient admitted here was not vaccinated. The Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress were called before the Board and called on to explain the cause of the complaint made by the Rev^d Mr Galvin — They both denied that the children under their charge were neglected in instruction in their catechisms and stated that the children were as well taught in this branch as the fluctuating nature of their attendance would allow :

They also stated that on the occasion of the examination in question the Rev^d Mr Galvin not only made no complaint of the manner in which the children were prepared in their catechism but on the contrary distributed several prizes as rewards for merit :

The Schoolmistress further stated that on a recent occasion when an examination of the children in the current school was about to take place, the Rev^d Mr Galvin asked her to allow the Workhouse children to attend the examination as she answered so much better than the children taught by the Nuns,

The Board directed the Clerk to write to the Rev^d Mr Galvin and ask him to explain by next Board day the inconsistency which appeared in his report; and requesting him to state whether under the circumstances stated he still adheres to his complaint as to the gross neglect of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress.

Sanitary

Mr Manley DO reported to the Board that in carrying out the Guardians instructions in reference to his duty as Sanitary Inspector he made application at the Wicklow Petty Sessions for a magistrates order to remove to Hospital the children of a man named Thomas Deas residing at Rathnew who are suffering from small pox, producing at the same time a Certificate from the Medical Officer stating that the house in which the family in question resides is unfit for human habitation and partly fallen in; He was informed by the officers of the Court that the magistrates had no power to make an order of the nature sought for; and that any proceeding he might institute with that view would be useless.

Under these circumstances the Guardians request that the Commissioners will inform them of the exact nature of the duty and authority of the Board of Guardians as Sanitary authority, and the extent of the Magistrates powers in removing persons suffering with small pox from houses unfit for human habitation, or of preventing persons suffering themselves, or whose families are suffering from small pox, from travelling on the public highways or in public conveyances; It would appear that the man above referred to and his wife are constantly travelling about the Country in the neighbourhood of Wicklow, returning home every night to where their children are sick of small pox and leaving in the morning to pursue their respective avocations.

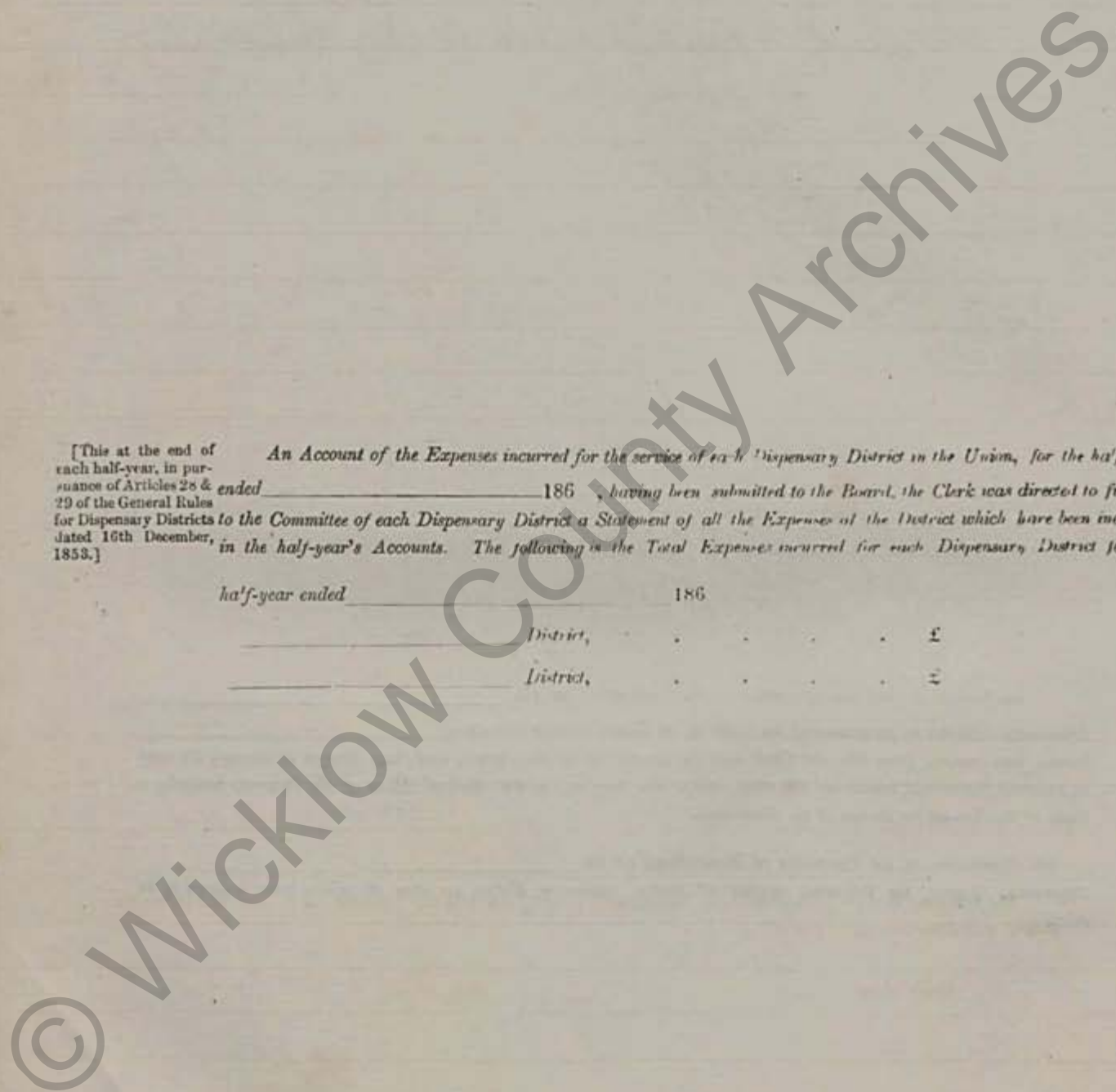

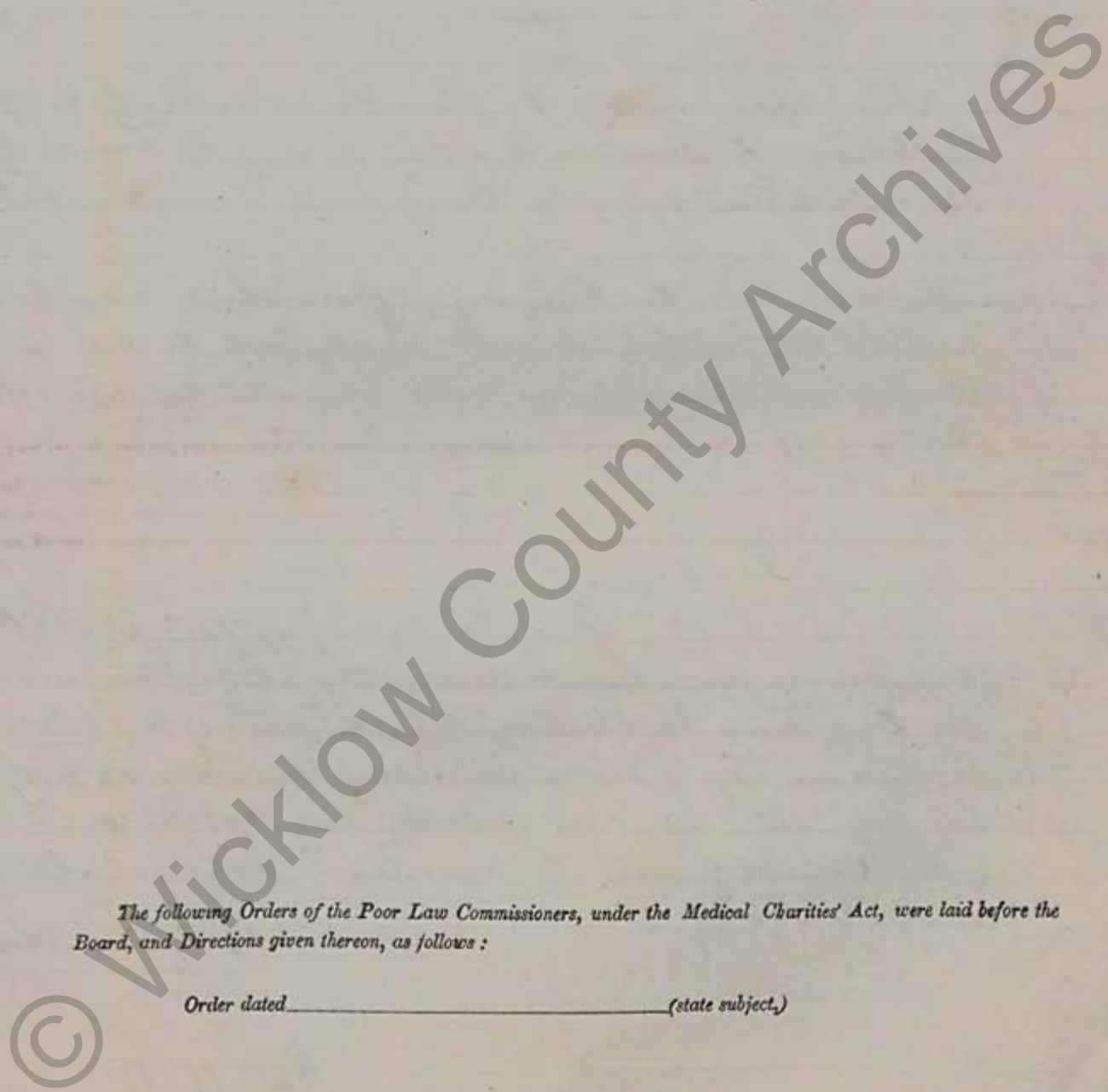

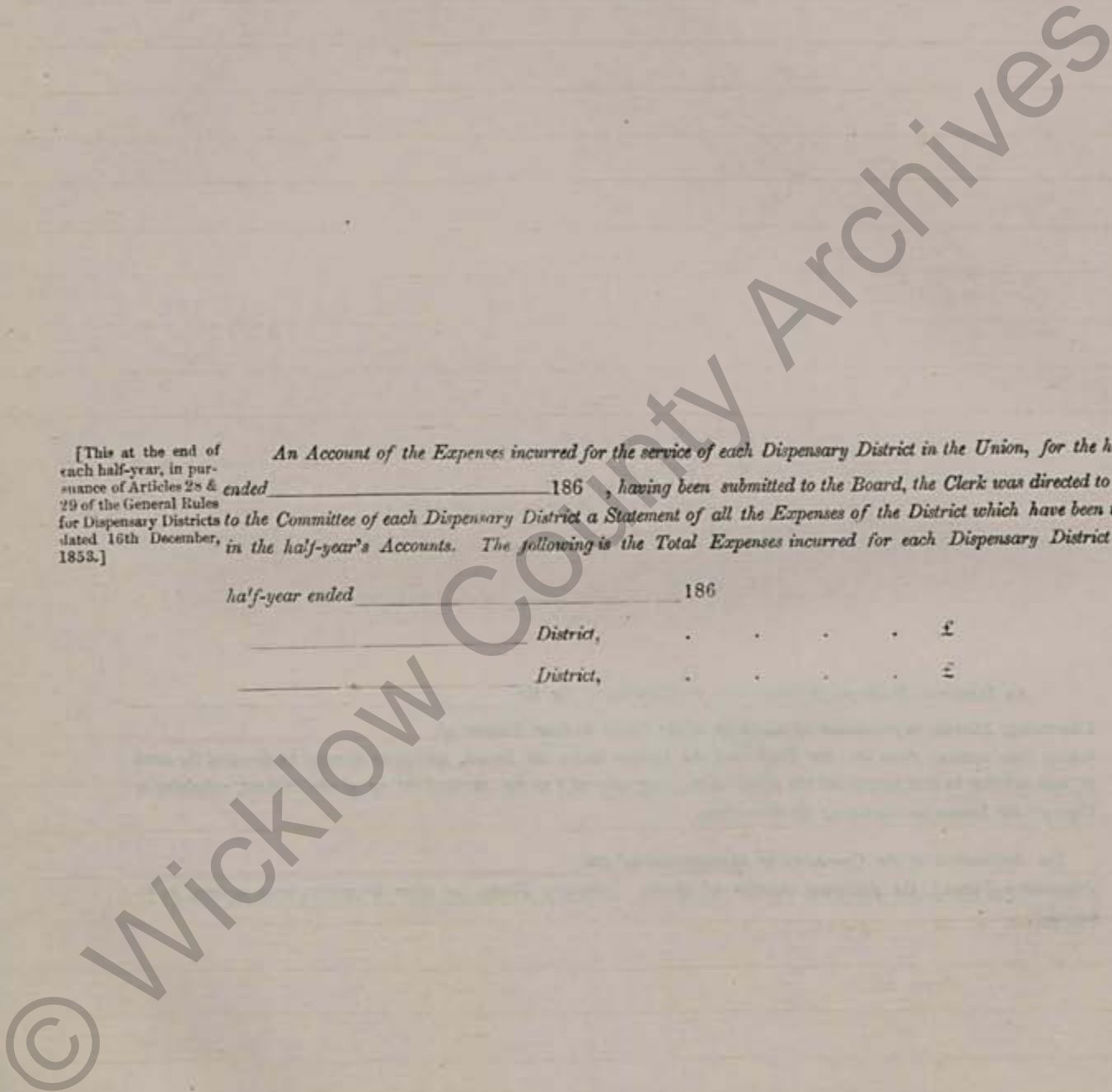

The Clerk of the Union submitted to the Board the Ledger and Abstracts of the Union accounts for the half year ending 29th Sept. last as audited by Mr. M^r Dermott P.L.O. on the 25 & 26 instant, and was about to read an amended copy of a memorandum made by the Auditor in reference to the accounts, when he was asked what the document he was about to read was and upon stating its nature and reading the Auditors letter requesting it to be substituted for the memorandum entered in the Ledger, which the Board refused to do and passed the following resolution

Resolved —

That the Board refuses to accede to the application of the Auditor to substitute an amended report for the one originally written by him in the Union Ledger, and the Clerk is directed to enter the said original report on the Minutes and not the amended one —

The original report is as follows —

- 1 The sum of £100.00 overdrawn on Sanitary account to be accounted for next half year. —
- 2 I directed the master in writing on the 30th of November 1870 to lodge monthly all monies coming into his hands. — That direction has not been complied with nor has any satisfactory reason been assigned to me for the omission to comply with it. —
- 3 I have observed a number of payments to the master for petty expenses incurred by him, these payments have not in all cases been accurately vouched. The master alleges the difficulty of obtaining vouchers in some cases, as for instance, in regard to Eggs and chickens purchased by him; This difficulty is

all experiences in other places. — I have stated to the Master that I shall debit him in future with all sums paid away which are not duly vouched by the receipt of the parties to whom they are stated to have been paid.

4

I have observed a payment of £5.5.0 made on the 16th of May 1870 (1?) for which no voucher has been produced to me — The Circumstances under which this payment was made are it appears as follows — on the 15th of May last the Master of the Workhouse received a note from Mr. Murray R.O. requesting that the Workhouse Van might be sent to Soughmore, Roundwood, in order to convey a case of Small pox to the Workhouse Fever Hospital, the Master dispatched the Van to Roundwood, directing the driver to wait there until he arrived, It would appear that the Master proceeded to Wicklow and subsequently to Roundwood, and that by his directions the case, instead of being brought into the Workhouse Fever Hospital was taken to the Wicklow Fever Hospital which is not under the control of the Guardians. The Wicklow Fever Hospital is it seems supported by subscription, and it appears that the Medical Officer in charge of the Hospital refused to take in the case, the Guardians not being subscribers, whereupon the Master subscribed £2.2.0 on behalf of the Board of Guardians and the Case was received; the Master reported the facts on next Board day stating at the same time that if the Guardians would subscribe £5.5.0 to the funds of the Hospital any cases that might arise would be taken in and the Guardians on his report signed a cheque for the amount which was handed to the Master; At the following Board meeting a letter was received from the Commissioners stating that the payment was without any legal authority, and on the same day the Master reported that he had received a letter from the Secretary to the Wicklow Hospital stating that the Governors objected to receive small pox cases and that he had not forwarded the additional subscription of £3.3.0; This latter sum was subsequently lodged and the balance of £2.2.0 was retained by the Master in order to recompense himself for the

money advanced by him in order to procure the admission of the patient to the Hospital - As a voucher for this latter sum a bill has been presented to me purporting to be for the maintenance of the patient in Hospital, but which does not in fact contain one item in relation to his maintenance, and it would appear that this bill was made out by the Secretary or for the Secretary to the Hospital at the suggestion of the Master in order to enable him to reconk himself, the Commissioners having declared that a payment in the form of a subscription was illegal.

I cannot pass this payment as a legal charge upon the Poor Rates, and in the exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the Irish Poor Relief Act I hereby disallow it, and I hereby debit it to the Guardians by whose signatures the payment was authorized, viz: to William Gilbert to Edward P Edge and Amadens Valentine, and I hereby require the said William Gilbert, Edward P Edge and Amadens Valentine to lodge the amount to the credit of the Union under penalty of proceedings for the recovery thereof with costs; -

5 With regard to the payment of £7.10.0 made on the 16th of May - see cheyne No 31 - for the maintenance of Jane Smith in the Moleyns Asylum I reserve my decision pending enquiry in regard to that Institution, and I reserve to myself the right to disallow it hereafter should the facts show that the payment is not legally chargeable upon the Poor Rates -

That the Board of Guardians have read with regret the letter of the Comms^s of the 11th inst in reference to Mr. Flower, and they beg to state that Mr. Flower having acted as Master of this Union for a period of 22 years to the perfect satisfaction of the Board they cannot but feel that to call on him now to resign would be a harsh course. It is not alleged, nor could it be even insinuated, that he had any corrupt motive in the course he pursued, which was one involving a deal of additional trouble on him, and carried out simply in compliance with the orders of the Guardians, who are alone responsible for any illegality there may be in the matter -

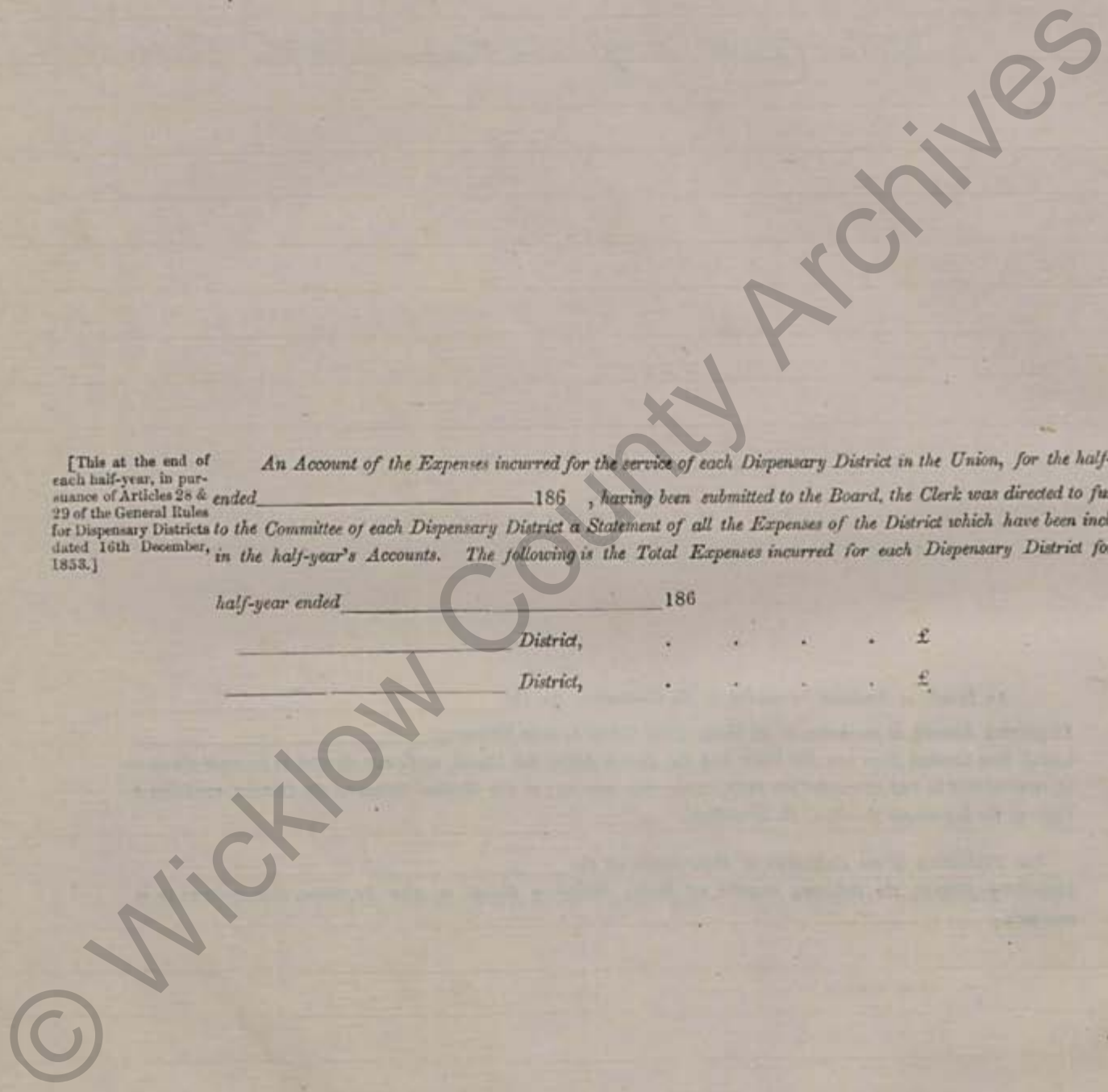

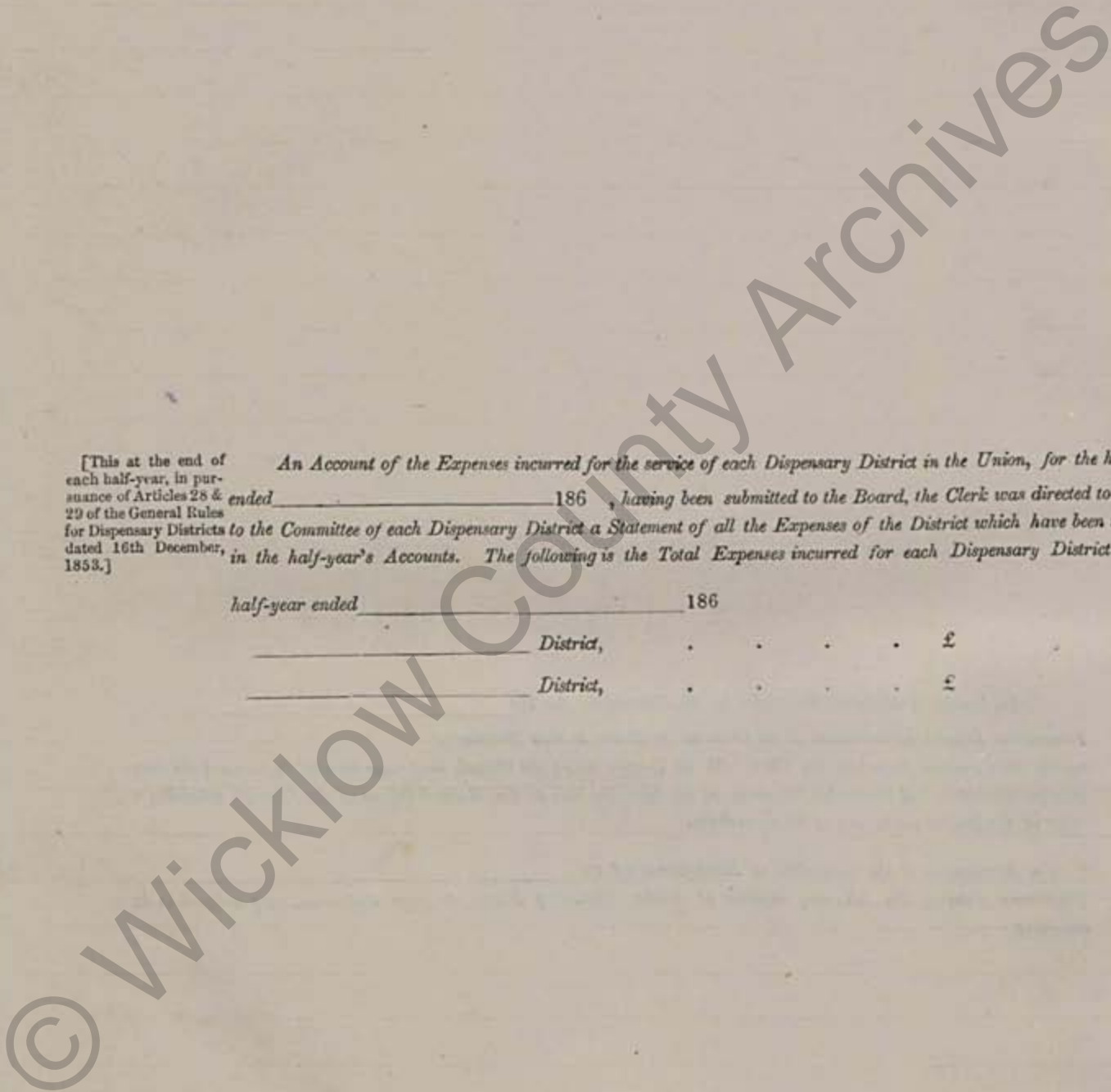
